

R. A. Cumming and Young Son Returned With Skins and Eggs of Birds Yesterday

INTERESTING HOLIDAY

Bringing with him a good collection of skins and eggs of the birds that nest on the Queen Charlotte Islands, R. A. Cumming, a Vancouver naturalist, was in Prince Rupert yesterday and continued his trip south on the Prince Charles, much pleased with the result of his holiday. He secured a number of excellent specimens of falcons, petrels, auklets and puffins, their eggs and some mammals. He also met the collecting expedition of the Academy of Sciences at Lucy Island near Langara under Wharton Huber of Philadelphia.

In addition to his collecting, Mr. Cummings and his young son Claude, 12 years of age, found out many new things about the habits the sea birds on the islands. For instance he found that the ancient murrelet nested in holes in the ground which they made someshore in the deep woods.
