



Interesting Situation on United Empire Property at Stewart As Tunnel Is Advanced

STEWART, Oct. 15: - William Dann, who has been doing further work on the United Empire in the last three weeks, came down the hill last week-end vastly pleased with conditions and states there is every indication that a cross vein has been encountered in the maindrift tunnel of the property. The vein appears to strike 80 degrees west of north, and the junction of the two veins is apparent in the face of the tunnel. No definite statenent can be made, nowever, until the vein has been driven on a little furher. Four feet seven inches of ore is now showing in the face, and it is interesting to note that as depth is obtained the copper content appreciably increases. Ruby silver can also be seen in the ore.

Albert Peterson, one of the oldest miners and prospectors in the Portland Canal, was working on the property and was surprised at the amount of ore opened up on the surface and in the tunnel. 


