

Fifty Thousand Nobbles to Visit Toronto Next Month for Imperial Council

WINNIPEG, May 30-In special trains and special cars on the Continental Limited, and the Confederation of the Canadian National Railways will come Shrine nomads from all over Western Canada and the Pacific Coast to the world's largest annual convention at Toronto next month when the Imperial Council of the Ancient and Arabic Order, Nobles of the Mystic Shrine, will hold its meetings at Exhibition Park.

According to R. Creelman, passenger traffic manager, three special trains from the west, with a day-stop in Winnipeg, will leave for the east on June 6 and 7. Special cars, arriving Winnipeg June 7, will carry Shriners from Nile Temple, Seattle, and Gizeh Temple, Vancouver and Victoria, while special trains will depart with delegates from Wawa Temple, Saskatoon and Regina, Islam Temple, San Francisco, on the same day and Khartum Temple, Winnipeg.

It is estimated by Mr. Creelman hat fully 50.000 Shriners and their families will be present from all over the United States and Canada and that some 150,000 spectators will flood the city to witness the colorful parades and pazeants. To assist in accomodating his immense number the Canalian National Railways are providing a city of sleeping cars which will take care of 10,000 Shriners and visitors, Mr. Creelman said.
