BUILT CITY BY ENERGY

Saskatoon Product of Efforts of a Group of Boosters Who Worked Hard on Job

WALKS MUST BE CLOSED

City Council Decides to Take Drastic Action Following Report of Engineer

ACTION AT ONCE

Other Sidewalks Will be Shut Down From Time to Time as it Becomes Necessary

A special meeting of the City Council last night took what may seem like drastic action when they decided to close to traffic such sidewalks in the central part of the city so badly out of repair as to be dangerous to pedestrian traffic. One of these specifically mentioned was the south side of Second Avenue from McBride to Third Street which is quite unsafe. The engineer is to use his discretion in regard to other streets, not closing more than are absolutely necessary.

The opposite side of Second Avenue where there are scarcely any buildings, it was decided, would have to do without a sidewalk for a time and also the west side of Seventh Street and part of Third Avenue West and one side of Third Street. For the other sidewalks in initiative bylaws would be put through providing for the construction of bitulithic sidewalk under the engineer's new plan. If these are petitioned against the streets will have to be without sidewalks until conditions change or some other plan is evolved. Construction of these will proceed if the finances allow.

A long discussion took place in regard to the whole matter in which most of the aldermen expressed themselves as opposed to drastic action except in such cases as it was found absolutely necessary. It was decided that repair of the old walks was out of the question and that new ones could be built on the local improvement plan. On the streets which must remain without walks for a time, it is probable that the old walks will be removed and a section of the street be set aside for pedestrian use.

The report of the engineer to the council to consider which the meeting was called is as follows: To Mayor and Aldermen, City of Prince Rupert, Gentlemen: I beg to present a report on immediate cost of repair of the following wooden sidewalks, to make them safe for traffic for the time being. Even with these repairs, I cannot guarantee their safety beyond one month and I anticipate repairs up to an additional fifty percent (50%) before the end of the year.

Location and cost of repair are as follows:

- 3rd Ave. north side from McBride to 3rd Street, \$1,200.
- 2nd Ave. north side from McBride to 3rd Street, \$1,200.
- 2nd Ave. south side from McBride to 3rd Street, \$1,200.
- 3rd Ave. both sides from 7th Street to 8th Street, \$800.
- 2nd Ave. north side from 7th Street to 8th Street, \$400.
- One side 1st Street from 2nd Avenue to 3rd Avenue, \$400.
- 2nd Street both sides from 2nd Avenue to 3rd Avenue, \$400.
- 3rd Street one side from 2nd Avenue to 3rd Avenue, \$400.
- 7th Street both sides from 2nd Avenue to 3rd Avenue, \$400.
- Total cost \$6,400.

All the other wooden sidewalks in Section 1 are in extremely bad state and, as the occasion arises, I propose to report when these sidewalks are beyond repair and become a public danger.

There is at present, a balance of approximately \$2000 left for wooden road and sidewalk maintenance and this balance is only sufficient for reasonable maintenance but not for renewals, to which the above repairs approximate.

I therefore beg to recommend that the above sidewalks be immediately closed to traffic and that any property owners desiring access to their properties be instructed to provide same from the edge of the road at their own cost. If considered desirable from the point of view of public safety, part of the road may be marked off by wooden headers for pedestrian traffic only.

HENRY ON WAY OVER

Vancouver, May 30.—S.S. Prince Henry the new Canadian National steamer to go on the Alaska run, left Birkenhead, England, for the Pacific Coast on Wednesday, according to advices received by B. C. Keeley, Pacific Coast manager, Canadian National Steamships, in command of Capt. J. M. Gilbert and manned by a skeleton crew. The new vessel, which recently completed her trials with an average speed of 23 1/2 knots, will complete the voyage in 20 days, arriving in Vancouver June 18. She will commence her first run up the picturesque coast-line from there on July 3, with Skagway as her destination.

En route to Vancouver, ss. Prince Henry will call at Fayal in the Azores, St. Thomas in the West Indies, Colon, Acapulco in Mexico and San Pedro. At the latter point Capt. Dan Donald, commodore skipper of the Canadian National fleet, will take command of the vessel, bringing her into British Columbia waters.

Sister ships of ss. Prince Henry, ss. Prince Robert and Prince David, are rapidly nearing completion and will be ready for their trials shortly. There two vessels will inaugurate the tri-city run between Vancouver, Victoria and Seattle in August next.
