## DRIVER IS BLAMELESS

McKinnon Held Not Responsible For Death of W. Hanson In Truck Accident

After a four-hour hearing, the oroner's jury investigating the death of William Hanson, who died Sunday morning as a result of injuries sustained the evening previous when a city truck on which he was riding plunged off an old plank roadway at the corner of Tenth driver in charge of the truck. Many witnesses were heard, these including practically all the other dozen men who were riding on the truck at the time of the accident. Alex McKinnon, who was the driver of the truck, also took the stand. A. M. Manson K.C. appeared as counsel for McKinnon while E. F. Jones appeared for the city. The witnesses were examined by Sergeant W. J. Service, chief of city police. John Dybhavn acted as interpreter for some of the Scandinavian witnesses who were unable to speak English very well.
