SCHOOL CADET SCANDAL IN CITY OF VICTORIA SUGGESTED

Laxity of Military Authorities Charge of Major W. J. Wilby

Former Instructor of Boys In Capital Declares That Recruiting Was Conducted With Price Per Head; Disposal of Funds Questioned

VICTORIA, Aug. 27:-Charges of a sensational nature directed against the administration of the public school cadet system in Victoria and elsewhere in Canada, implying laxity on the part of military authorities in permitting the wholesale recruiting of cadets at a price per head and questioning the disposition of cadet funds were made at a meeting of the Victoria school board last night by Major W. J. Wilby, former cadet instructor in the Victoria High School. Wilby claimed that he had been forced to resign because of his activities in attempting to clear up the situation.

It is intimated that the charges may be brought before the House of Commons at its next session.

Scottish Expert to Chart North Atlantic and Establish Fisheries Experimental Station For Newfoundland

ST. JOHNS. Newfoundland. Aug. 27:- The government of Newfoundland in collaboration with the Empire Marketing Board has underway a progressive move to aid the fisheries of the Ancient Colony and the marketing of the product involving the expenditure of \$50,000 annually for five years. This amount is to be granted on an equal share basis by the government and the board and will result in charting of the North Atlantic around Newfoundland, and a check 4 E. B. BOTHFLEW INFRANCE

Missing Commercial Pilot Was in British Service; Rescue Man in German

Twelve or thirteen years ago Capt. E. J. A. Burke and W. A. Joerss, now pilot for the Airland Manufacturing Co. in cemmercial air service in Northern British Columbia, were probably chasing each other around over the French battlefields of the Great War intent on bringing each other down. Now Joerss is chasing Burke again but it is on a search of mercy for the latter has been missing for more than a week on a flight from Atlin to Liard River. It is very likely that Joerss is a good deal more keen today on finding Burke and rescuing him than be was doring the war in locating opposing airmen and shooting them

Burke was an aviator with the British forces in the war and Joerss was enrolled in the aerial service of the German army. Both learned flying in the war and acquitted themselves with distinction in their

respective services. Pilot Joerss was here yesterday on his way north from Vancouver and arrived at Juneau late in the afternoon. He was to take off today for Atlin. He is confident that Burke has met with no serious accident and that he will be able to locate and rescue him safely and with despatch.

The search for Capt. Burke got actually under way today when Pilot Joerss took off from Atlin for the Liard River area according to a telegraphic despatch received this afternoon.


