J. E. Monroe, the Stewart miner who has been in the city some days is leaving for Vancouver on to-night's boat.

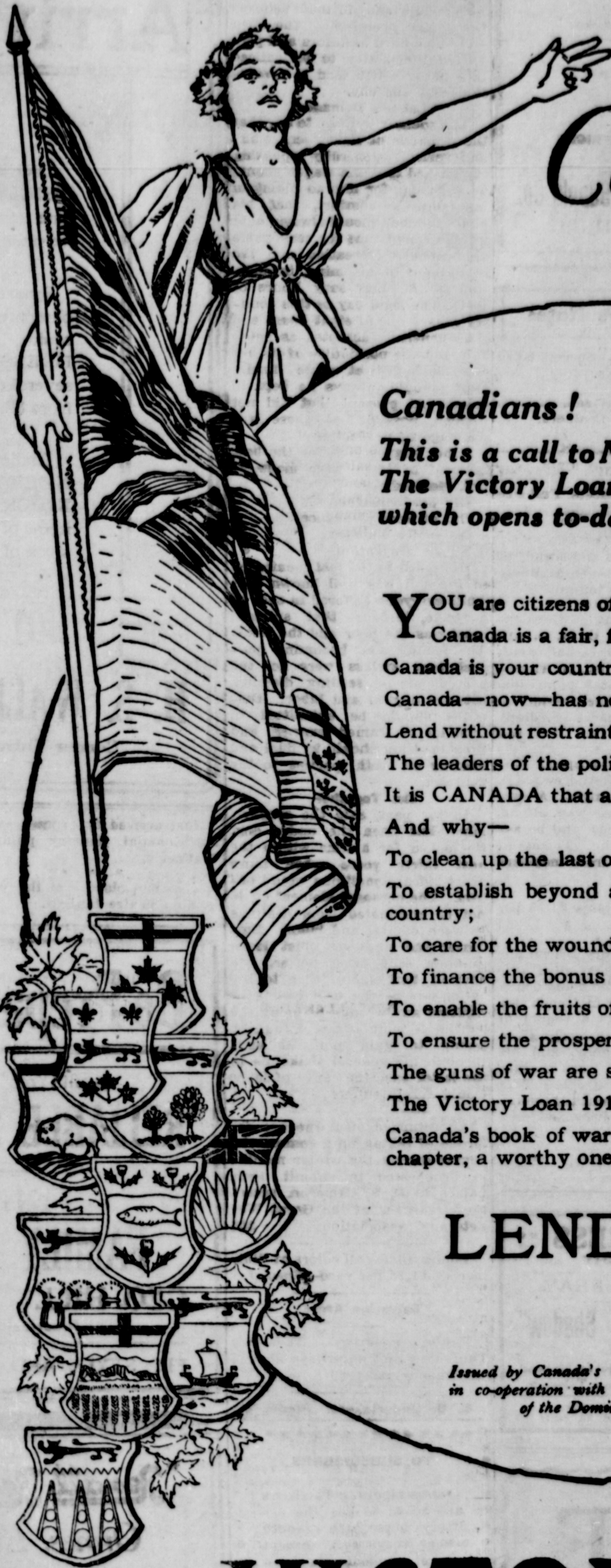
Among the arrivals by the train Tuesday evening was Mrs. C. R. Albert, of Terrace. She is registered at the Hotel Prince Rupert.
