The meeting was called to protest against the Howe regulations and to advance proposed substitute regulations for consideration of both the provincial and Dominion governments. Shore Patrol

It was also suggested at the meeting that men be placed on shore, as well as on boats, for fishbeach. The body will be taken to ery protection work at the head of Cumshewa Inlet, Church Creek and Echo Harbor. It is believed that shore patrol of these waters will be more effective.

Another suggestion was that large boulders or cement blocks be placed at the mouths of creeks to prevent night poaching with seines.

A. Jones advanced the suggestion that all seines be done away with and that only gill nets be permitted. He contended that seines destroyed everything and that gill nets held only a certain amount of fish and took only a uniform size of salmon. If seines were to be continued, L. Watson proposed that all live rollers be done away with as this method of hauling in the seine encouraged poaching.

Sol Wilson held that bears on the Queen Charlotte Islands restroyed thousands of salmon out of the spawning grounds. Saw bill ducks and eagles were also offenders. He suggested that a bounty be placed on all these.
