SEARCH FOR RENAHAN AND COMPANIONS IS FRUITLESS

Major Construction Defects In Dirigible Revealed By Papers Presented to Probe in London

Gas Had Lost Lifting Power; Wiring System Brought Gas Bags Into Contact With Girders and They Were Rubbed By Nuts and Bolts For Distance

LONDON, Nov. 7:-Documents indicating that major construction faults had been discovered in the dirigible R-101 before she was sliced in two for the insertinn of a 75-foot section were introduced today at the inquiry into the ship's loss. One of them was a memorandum by Col. V. C. Richmond, designer of the craft, who perished in its

crash. In it he noted that holes in the gas bag caused serious loss of lifting power. The second document was a memorandum from the department of inspections. It noted that modofications in the dirigible's wiring system had brought the gas bags up against the longitudinal girders where the bag rubbed Grand Black Preceptory of Orange against nuts and bolts. Such points of fouling occurred at hundreds of points, the memorandum stated.

NEW CLUES ARE FOUND

Bright Fire on Stephens Island Reported But Not on Date Renahan Was Coming

SEEN AT LEWIS ISLAND

Two new clues were revealed today in connection with the search for Robin Renahan, missing Seattle pilot, and his two companions.

One of the new items of information was that a plane circled twice over Lawson Harbor, Porcher Island, on the evening of October 28 and then headed across towards Kennedy Island.

The other clue, not a very positive one as yet, was given by Eddie Ryan of Metlakatla who said that he saw from Metlakatla a bright fire on the very peak of Stephens Island. Ryan says, however, that this was a week ago last Saturday. He is to check up the date.

The search plane has already scoured Kennedy, Smith and Gibson Islands and the east shore of Stephens but found no trace of the missing plane. Pilot Eckmann also went up the Skeena River mouth
