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## PRESENTS FOR POOR

Italy's Prince Asks This Instead of Wedding Gifts

ROME, March 6.—Prince Humbert, heir to the Italian throne, though he bestowed some priceless gifts on his bride, Princess Marie-Jose of Belgium, asked those of his future subjects that might feel inclined to celebrate the happy event by presents to give them instead to the poor and unfortunate.

The response to the Prince's wish has been well-nigh universal throughout the kingdom. In Udine, far to the north, his marriage was celebrated by the inauguration of the Umberto di Savoia Heliotherapy Institute, where the tubercular may find health and strength in the rays of the sun. A similar station will be erected high on the Carso Plateau, scene of some of the most trying of the late war's engagements; and ex-service men will have precedence as patients. This is the gift of the Province of Trieste.

At Lucco, the provincial section of the National Organization for the Protection of Maternity and Infancy has voted to commemorate the wedding by constructing an asylum capable of caring for 60 war orphans of poor peasant families. In the Province of Milan, the "House of Umberto I," a veterans' welfare organization named after the Prince's grandfather, has benefited by a number of contributions, one of the most striking being from a Belgian businessman resident in Italy.

The Fascist Industrial Union of Naples has voted over \$5,000 to go toward the establishment of scholarships for sons of workmen and minor employees, to enable them to pursue their studies. Other charitably inclined Neapolitans are contributing to the erection of a whole new quarter of workmen's houses, built in modern hygienic principles. This new village will bear the Prince's name, and he will be invited to Naples to inaugurate it.

A new "kitchen for the poor" capable of caring for the out-of-work for three months every winter, will be instituted at Capodistria. At Leghorn a day-nursery and laboratory for the benefit of abandoned mothers will be built and confided to the sisters of charity, and named for the Prince's bride.

## Shakespeare's Glory Rightfully Bacon's

Poet of Illegitimate Birth Victim of Literary Fraud, Californian Finds

SACRAMENTO, Mch. 6.—After a year of investigation in England, J. Edward Morgan, until recently proprietor of a printshop in Oakland, has arrived at the conclusion that glory rightfully due Francis Bacon has been thrown to William Shakespeare by English scholastic circles because of royal politics and a prudish antipathy for a man of illegitimate birth.

Morgan, it was announced recently in Stratford-on-Avon, the home of Shakespeare, is returning to the United States with what he believes is conclusive proof that Bacon has been made the scape-goat of a gigantic literary fraud.

A not unknown writer of verse himself, Morgan has for years been interested in the theory of the Baconian authorship of the plays attributed to the Bard of Avon, and his culminating investigation of the speculation led him to sell his printshop to obtain funds.

Morgan has obtained enlarged photographs of the bindings and pages of the original folios, and asserts that in the very decorations, pictures and letterings of the script Bacon wrote his name many times over.

His son, Walter Morgan, of Sacramento, chief of the division of research and statistics of the State Department of Education in California, said that his father believes Bacon's illegitimate birth was the cause of his denial of literary recognition.

C. N. R. steamer Prince John, Capt. William Thomas, arrived in port at 9 o'clock this morning from Vancouver via the Queen Charlotte Islands and will be here until Saturday night when she will return south on the same route.

## Rived Spruce Here From Islands For St. Paul Shipment

Arriving here on the Prince John this morning from the Queen Charlotte Islands was a shipment of 24,000 feet of rived Sitka Spruce which will be transhipped by rail to St. Paul, Minn. The timber came from the operations of the Bernsfield Logging Co. in Skidegate Inlet. The camp there is making regular shipments of this rived spruce to the Central States.

## TO RESUME MINE WORK

Activity on United Empire Property at Stewart is Planned

Situated in a direct line between the Prosperity and Silverado properties and the Premier, the United Empire, one of the interesting Portland Canal developments, will be the scene of activity again this year, officials of the company state. The United Empire is owned outright by the company, which reports a favorable financial condition, and at a meeting to be held in Vancouver, the program for the year will be discussed.

The directorate, which consists of William Dann, managing director; Col. John Leckie, C. H. L. Banson, Joseph F. Morris, W. S. Lane, J. E. B. Dickson and F. P. Janowski, is pleased with the report submitted by Mr. Dann, covering the work done on the United Empire during 1929.

Mr. Dann points out in his report that samples were taken across the face of the tunnel in which the principal work was being done last year, giving values in gold, silver, lead and zinc, and that the values persisted as the tunnel was driven.

When work ceased last year there was a showing of four feet of good ore across the face of the tunnel. The extension of the present drift for 150 feet should bring the workings under the high grade ore out-cropping, which has been spectacular. Sampling by several engineers, including two government engineers, gave results showing gold values and silver running from 207 ounces to the ton, with lead and zinc. The vein at this point is six feet in width and samples were taken across 24 to 27 inches of the vein.

Mr. Dann states that, after driving the additional distance, the high grade shoot could be mined, with ore shipped at a comparatively low cost. With this work done the face of the tunnel would be about 100 feet below the surface. To date values at depth have been much greater than those near the surface, and it is believed by engineers that this will continue to be the case in this ore shoot.

The formation is the same as on the Silverado, Prosperity and Porter-Idaho properties, which lends weight to the opinion that excellent values will be obtained at depth.

The Vulcan Engineering Works Ltd. has been formed in Vancouver by M. Y. Aivazoff and H. J. F. Turney to take over for a consideration of \$500,000 the Vulcan Iron Works Ltd. The company specializes in construction of boilers and tanks as well as other work.

## New American Halibut Boat In

Maddock of Tacoma Here With 15,000 Pounds After Maiden Trip to Banks

Another new halibut boat is in port today after its maiden trip to the fishing grounds. This is the Maddock which has a catch of 15,000 pounds.

The Maddock is a 40-foot four-man boat which was built in Tacoma last fall for Capt. John Skarpsness. She is named after William Maddock, manager of the Seattle Fish Exchange.

Both the Maddock and the Canadian boat Gulvik, which arrived yesterday with 7,000 pounds, are holding over until tomorrow.
