Attempts Made on Two Premises in Gd. Forks District Central B. C.

Inflammable Material and Explosives Found In Two Institutions of Learning at Week-End

NELSON, Dec. 15:-Attempts to bomb and burn two Doukhobor schools in the Grand Forks district were made over the week-end. In Outlook school a burning candle to which was attached an oil-soaked rope and other inflammable material was discovered under the steps in the basement. In Fruitova school was found an improvised bomb of nitro-glycerine and dynamite. The fuse had died out before reaching the explosives.
