STRATFORD-ON-AVON. March 15.—Plans for the celebration of Shakespeare's birthday anniversary April 23 include an all-day program.

The parish church bells will usher in the day after which the Shakespeare Club will hold its annual meeting. The unfurling of more than 30 national flags will take place at noon. A floral procession made up of hundreds of distinguished guests will visit the birthplace in the afternoon and then will go to the parish church where the vicar will receive the wreaths, chaplets, and flowers placing them on the poet's tomb.

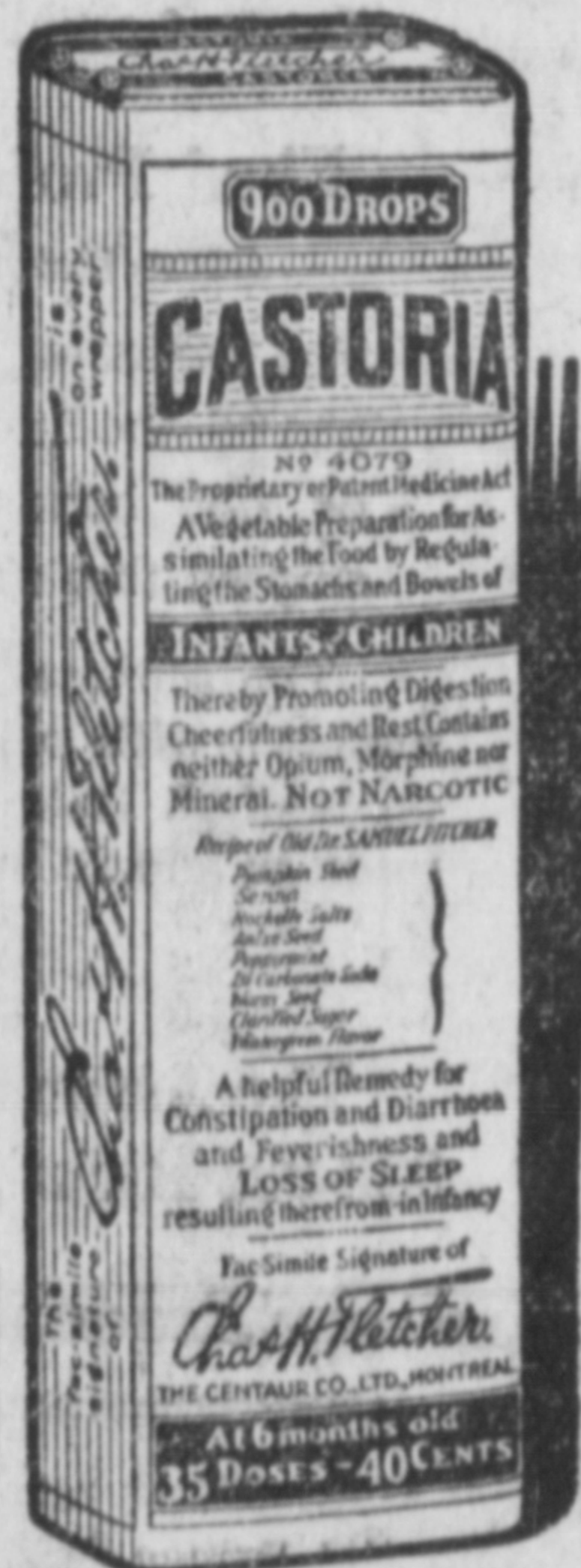

Princess Louise Celebrates Two Anniversaries

LONDON, March 15.—The month of March brings two notable anni-

versaries for Princess Louise, Duchess of Argyll, widow of a former Governor-General of Canada, who was in youth the best-looking, and throughout her life has been the best liked of Queen Victoria's several daughters. She will on March 18 be 82 years of age, and the twenty-first of the month will see the fifty-ninth anniversary of her

marriage to the young Marquess of Lorne, then the popular heir to the Argyll dukedom.
Of her mother's numerous family, only one other daughter, Princess Beatrice—the mother of the Queen of Spain—and one son, the Duke of Connaught, survive; and to Canadians it should be a special point of interests that two of these

three royal personages have enjoyed prolonged and influential association with their great Dominion.
The Duke of Connaught was Governor-General during five momentous years, which included the early period of the Great War, and the Princess Louise was the wife of one of his predecessors in that ex-

alted position. Her reign at that time may now only be a memory to Canadians of the older generation, as it is a matter of history ago, but it covered an important stage in the development of the country and was surrounded by an atmosphere of romance and culture.
