OTTAWA, Jan. 3.—To the people of Canada, Gen. Jan Smuts, former premier of South Africa, speaking here last night, brought a message of unity, liberty and nationhood which had been achieved by the Dominion of the British Empire. There was another task, however, which remained to be undertaken, he declared. That task was to give form and substance to the unity in that great group which was known as the British commonwealth of nations.

H. F. PULLEN OFFERS AS ALDERMANIC CANDIDATE

Managing-Director of Daily News Seeks Seat on City Council This Year

H. F. Pullen, managing-director of The Daily News, announces that he will be a candidate for the office of alderman at the forthcoming general election. In connection with his candidacy Mr. Pullen says: "I have no particular criticism to make of the work of the city council of last F. C. Biette One of Best Known Colyear, but I feel that at a time when there is hope of expansion and great need for it, there should be an active campaign to try to bring this about and that without spending pointed C.N.R. colonization agent much money. It should be one of the duties of an alderman, known colonization officials in the in addition to carrying on the ordinary business, to help put up a vigorous campaign for extension of the industrial activities of the city. With this in view I have in mind active propaganda along the following lines

1. I would urge that the city take active steps to try to induce the Canadian Pacific Railway to make its northern outlet at Prince Rupert. 2. I would co-operate in every possible way with the Canadian Na-

tional Railway in anything which would make for the progress of Prince Rupert and particularly in connection with the proposed tourist hotel, with the suggested steamship line to the Orient and with the new efforts to make this a live distributing port.

3. I would continue activities with a view to securing the Peace River outlet at Prince Rupert. Without spending a large amount of money this activity should be continued.

I would co-operate with the Board of Trade with a view to securing the widest publicity for the city. 5. I would urge the cancellation of the elevator lease if the Wheat C.N.R. of superintendent of agricul-Pool does not take more active steps to utilize the port.

"I feel it would be in the interests of the city for the ratepayers to adopt the sewer bylaw and the McBride Street bylaw, most of the work on which has already been completed.
