"Britain Is No Longer Alone Mistress of Our Destiny," Says Wartime Premier-Right Is Unsound Says Former Finance Minister

SYDNEY, Australia, Oct. 2:- "The suggestion that Britain by herself can dissolve the Empire without con-(estimated); Home Oil office, \$100 sulting us is monstrous," declared Rt. Hon. W. M. that "nobody questions the right of a Dominion to secede." Mr. Hughes NORTHOLOTT protested against Britain "attempting to grant the right to secede or anybody proclaiming the right to secede from the Empire without consulting Canada, Australia, and other parts of the Empire."

"It is time Britain realizes that she is no longer alone the mistress of our destiny," said Mr. Hughes, "and if General Hertzog, the South African Prime Minister, thinks he can be within the British Empire and simultaneously outside of it, it is time some one told him the
