Have Done Excellent Work This Season—Large Lot Dispatched This Morning to Interior

Boy Scouts of the city, under the leadership of P. C. 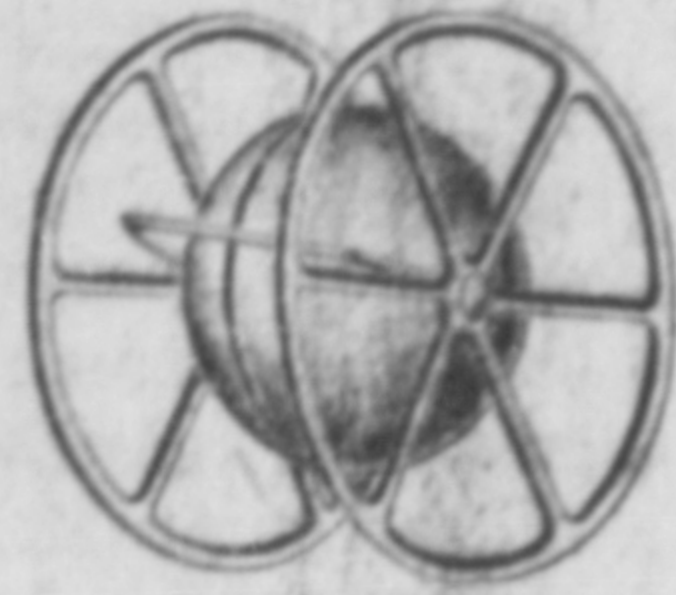

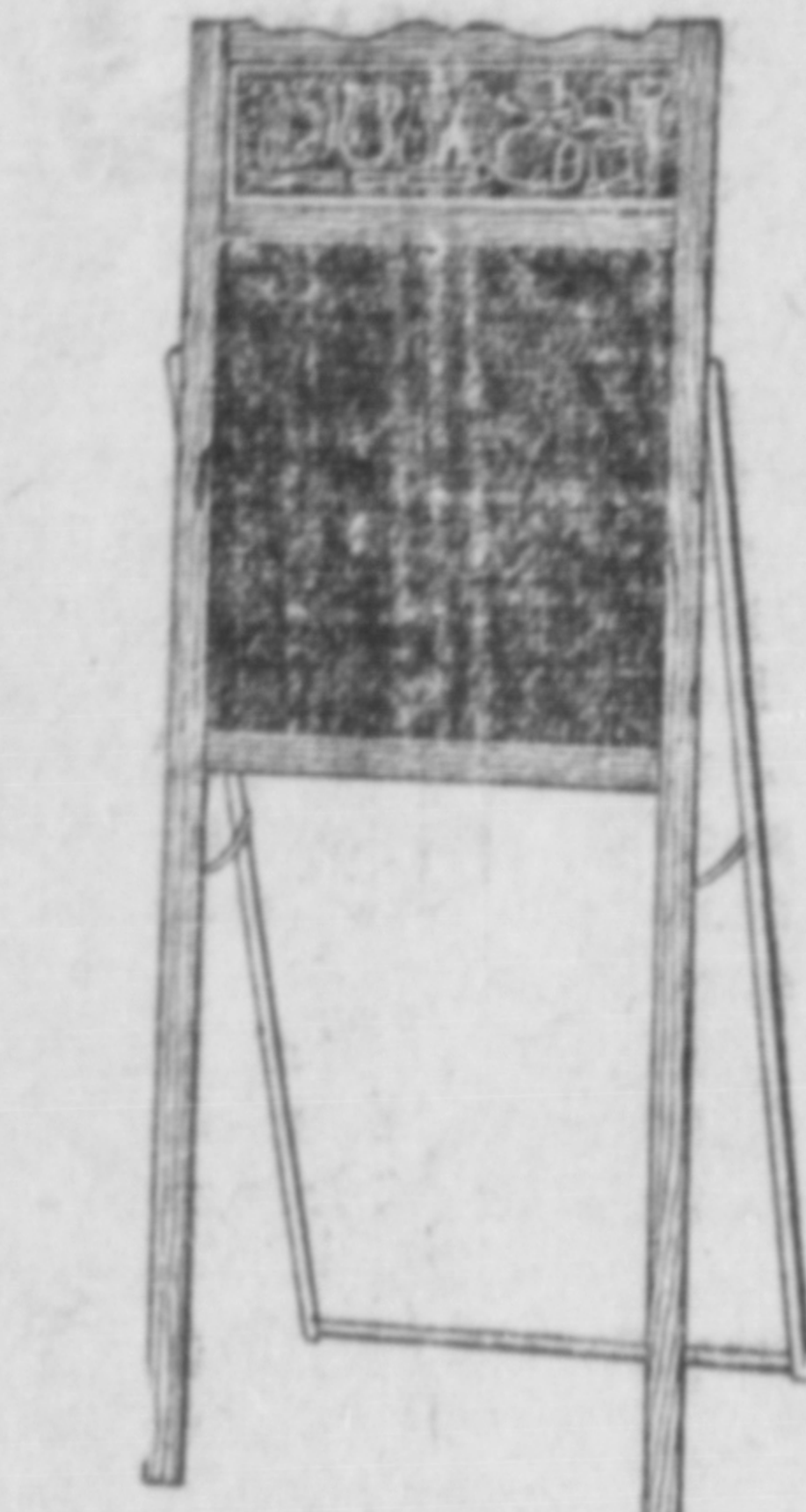

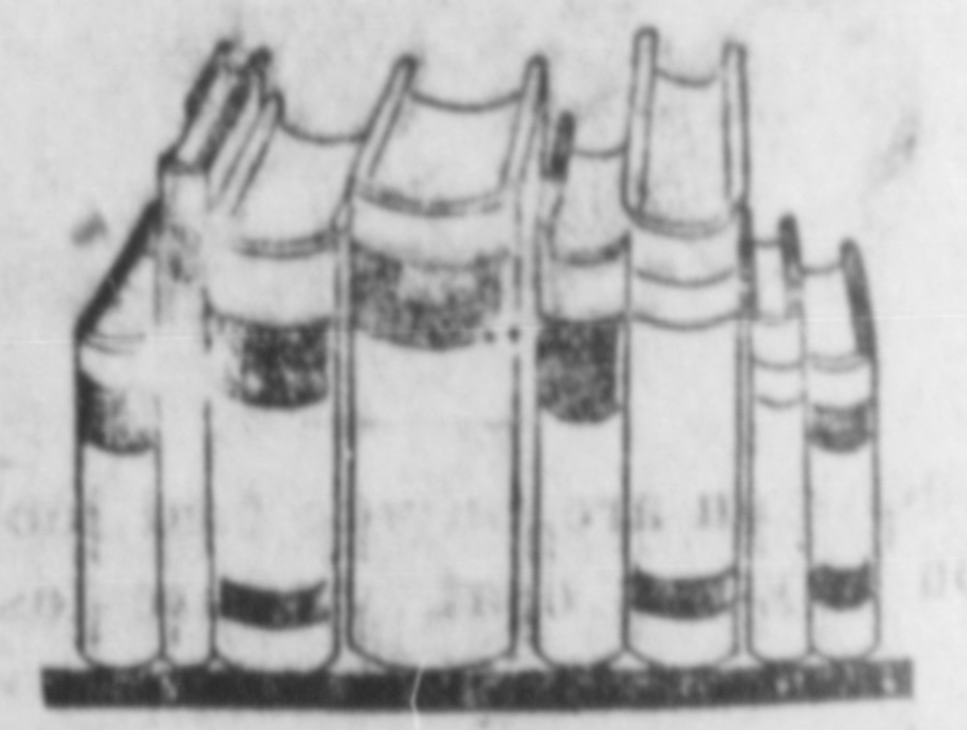
