SHIP SINKS AND FORTY-FIVE DROWN

REMAINS OF CAPTAIN BURKE DELIVERED AT WHITEHORSE

Finnish Boats Collide In Kattegat, One Going Down in Four Minutes

Famous British Cricketer Is Among Victims of Tragedy—Vessels Which Struck Were Commanded By Two Brothers

COPENHAGEN, Denmark, Dec. 20.—Forty-five persons aboard the Finnish liner Oberon, including 17 passengers, are believed to have been drowned in the icy waters of the Kattegat off Lasso Island last night when the vessel collided with the Finnish steamer Arcturus and sank in four minutes. The Arcturus saved 36 persons, many of whom are seriously injured. The collision occurred in a dense fog.

PRINCE RUPERT FUNNELS LOWER

In the course of recent renovation at Vancouver, the three stacks of the C. N. R. steamer Prince Rupert were cut down considerably according to word reaching the city. Cutting down of the stacks had been mooted ever since the Rupert and the George were converted to oil burners years ago. It was realized that lower stacks would improve the appearance of the vessels and the change is reported to have the effect of making the Rupert a much trimmer looking ship. She is at present on the tri-city run from Vancouver in place of the Prince David.

When the Prince George has her annual overhaul this year, it is expected that she too, will have her funnels cut down.

Unemployed Stage Demonstration In Vancouver But Are Routed By Police After Brief Street Riot

VANCOUVER, Dec. 20.—Nine persons, eight men and one woman, were arrested yesterday afternoon following a demonstration of unemployed on Victory Square and later at the Cambie Street grounds. They were remanded on appearing in city police court this morning until December 24. Each was given freedom on bail of \$50. Seven were charged with assaulting police officers and two, including the arrested woman, with unlawful assembly.

LIEUT. COL. WOODS DIES

Enterprising Business Man and Patron of Arts As Well As Public Spirited Citizen

OTTAWA, Dec. 20.—Lieut. Col. James W. Woods, aged 68, well known manufacturer, died here this morning.

Lieut. Col. Woods, president of the Woods Manufacturing Company, was not only an enterprising business man but a patron of the arts and a public spirited citizen. The central plant of the company is at Hull, Que., while branch factories are located at Montreal, Toronto, Winnipeg and Ottawa. He owned cotton mills at Welland, Ont. Always a firm believer in the future of Ottawa, he built several of the capital's larger buildings, some of which now house government departments.

During a busy career, Col. Woods found time to devote his energies to several philanthropic enterprises. He was vice-president of the Ottawa Red Cross, was chairman of the special committee for subscription to the Victory Loans from 1916 to 1918 and was chairman of the British Sailors' and Soldiers' Relief Fund in 1917. He was president of the Carleton County Protestant Hospital (later amalgamated with the Civic Hospital) and equipped the Woods dental clinic in 1902.

The collection of paintings at his home, Kildare House, Ottawa, is considered one of the finest in Canada. He was permanent chairman of the Earl Grey Musical and Dramatic Competition.

Lieut. Col. Woods was born at Kildare, Que. April 10, 1863, and was a son of Russell and Anne Woods. He was educated in private schools and Montreal College. He was associated with several firms before he entered business for himself in 1895.

In 1893 he married Ida F. Edwards, and to them were born five children; the late Capt. John R. Woods, of the Coldstream Guards, who was killed in the battle of the Somme, September, 1916; Margaret C. Woods, who married Major G. Sackville Browne, D.S.O., Montreal; Ida E. Woods, now Mrs. John R. Booth, Ottawa; Shirley Edwards Woods and James W. Woods, jr.

Lieut. Col. Woods was first president of the Ottawa Hunt Club, of which the Duke of Connaught is the honorary president. He was for some years, colonel commanding the Governor General's Foot Guards, and was honorary member of the Guards Club of London, Eng. In 1909-10 he was attached to the Coldstream Guards of England. He was a member of the Rideau Club, Ottawa; Mount Royal Club, Montreal; Toronto Club and York Club, Toronto; Widham Club, London, Eng., and the Manitoba Club, Winnipeg. He was also a member of the Royal Geographical Society.



Pilot Wasson Finishes Grim Rescue Task With Bringing Out of Body

Inquest to Be Held In Yukon Town Before Corpse Is Taken to Widow at Atlin Where Interment Will Be Made

JUNEAU, Dec. 20.—Reports from Whitehorse say that Pilot E. L. Wasson arrived there late yesterday from the upper Liard River country with the body of Capt. E. J. A. Burke, who died of exposure and starvation on November 20 after having landed his plane six weeks previous in a snowstorm after which the machine was frozen in.

FUNDS ARE AVAILABLE

Northern British Columbia Included In Latest Unemployment Grants

OTTAWA, Dec. 20.—Additional construction programs and other items in the federal government's joint unemployment relief scheme with the provinces and municipalities calling for expenditure of more than \$295,000,000 have been approved by Senator Gideon Robertson, minister of labor. Amounts now approved in British Columbia include the following per electoral ridings:

Bennett and Woods Different Persons

Provincial police officers have satisfied themselves that A. Woods who was here last fall after mugging it out from the Peace River country, was not John Noel Patch Bennett, wealthy young Englishman, whose whereabouts is sought by relatives in England. Bennett, like Woods had done, set out on foot from Pouce Coupe with the intention of hiking to the coast. The two men were very much alike in respect to age and general appearance.

GOING TO INDIA

LONDON, Dec. 20.—Viscount Willingdon, who is completing a four-year term as Governor General of Canada, has been appointed Viceroy and Governor General of India, succeeding Lord Irwin, it was announced last night.

OTTAWA, Dec. 20.—Premier Bennett, in a statement last night, said that the appointment of Viscount Willingdon as Viceroy of India would undoubtedly involve His Excellency's leaving Canada before the actual end of his term. The date of his departure is not yet determined. Lord Irwin's term expires in March.

SEARCH IS ABANDONED

Hope For Safety of Two Fishermen Practically Given Up—Grier Starrett Back

There is little if any hope now of finding alive Pete Laporte jr. and Henry Rudland, who were blown out to sea from Lucy Island in a squall last Friday afternoon. It is now presumed that the dory, in which the two men were carried away, was swamped in the treacherous waters of Chatham Sound and that they perished from drowning.

CANADIAN PACIFIC SUPT ENGINEER IS RETIRING FROM POST

VANCOUVER IN BAD WAY

Needs More Money For Unemployment Relief—Mayor Malkin Calls It "Emergency"

VANCOUVER, Dec. 20.—Vancouver, faced with what Mayor Malkin terms "a state of emergency," has authorized the expenditure of some \$450,000 for work to relieve unemployment but the fund including sums provided by both the provincial and federal governments is exhausted, it was stated to a special conference yesterday of interested bodies called by the mayor. A strong delegation will interview representatives of the provincial government and Hon. H. H. Stevens here next Wednesday.

Mayor Malkin stated that Vancouver, with fifty per cent of the province's population and seventy-five per cent of its unemployed, received only \$390,000. The mayor asked why so much money had been spent in unorganized territory when Vancouver's problem was known to the government.
