Coste And Bellonte Succeed In Paris To New York Ocean Hop

Intrepid French Aviators Made Trip in Thirty-Seven Hours and Eighteen-and- Half Minutes-Col. Lindbergh One of First to Greet Them

CURTIS FIELD, Sept. 3:—Dieudonne Coste and Maurice Bellonte in the plane "Question Mark" arrived here at 6:12 last evening, completing the first non-stop flight ever made from Paris to New York. Their time was thirtyseven hours and eighteen-and-a-half minutes. All New York celebrated the arrival of the intrepid French aviators and many notables were on hand to greet them on their safe arrival including Col. Charles A. Lindbergh who was the first to make the non-stop flight in the eastward direc-
