Not only is this very clearly understood by manufacturers in this province, but many instances can be cited where products of British Columbia factories are actually of higher quality but no higher in price, than those made elsewhere.

During the past five or six years there has been a very marked changes in the attitude of the average buyer. More and more consideration is being given to British Columbia products. This changed attitude is reflected in the growth of old industries and the beginning of many new ones. This change in sentiment on the part of the buyer has been so marked within the last two years that many manufacturers have been encouraged to branch out into finer grades than have hitherto been made in the province. Industrial progress in British Columbia is definitely under way.

All of this has been brought about by a realization on the part of the citizens of this province that British Co-|lumbia products are at least the equal of goods they can obtain elsewhere. From now on, what is required is the cultivation of a friendly feeling of co-operation between consumer and manufacturer and a realization of the fact that through this co-operation more and more opportunities can be created for our young people, bigger payrolls can be distributed, and a period of substantial prosperity can be brought about by each one of us making it our particular job to insist on British Columbia products on every possible occasion.
