Abolition of Submarines Now Under Consideration By Naval Disarmanent Conference, London

Great Britain and United States Would Abolish Undersea Craft Altogether; France and Japan Favor Them; Italy Wavers

LONDON, Feb. 11.—The naval disarmament conference at 1 o'clock this afternoon concluded its fourth plenary session during which delegates from Great Britain and * the United States called upon world sea powers to abolish * submarines. France and Japan insisted upon their continuation, but the outlawry of their use in an "inhuman manner." Italy announced herself ready to participate in discussions for abolition of undersea



Car Licence Receipts Will No Longer Be Expended Upon Roads Provincial Government Decides

VICTORIA, Feb. 11. - Under the government's new motor-vehicle legislation, its obligation to use two-thirds of its receipts from motor licences for highway purposes is being deliberately wiped out in order to assist the administration to restore order in its tangled general finances, T.
