The Prince Rupert Dry Dock and Shipyard has been awarded the contract to build another 17-car steel car barge for the service of the Canadian National Railways between Port Mann and Vancouver Island, it is announced. The order is for a barge similar to that which was built at the local yard last year and, while having a number of improvements on the first barge, will be similar in general arrangement.
