Sport Briefs

Norman Ross broke the world's
swimming record for speed at
Honolulu on Saturday when he
swam 1,000 yards in 12 minutes
and 44.6 seconds. He also broke
the American record by swimming
880 yards in 11 minutes and 12.4
seconds.

A meeting of the rules com-
mittee of the American and Na-
tional baseball leagues is to be
held in the near future. There
are many new rules and reforms
to old ones to be discussed.
Among changes that are advo-
cated by high-up baseball au-
thorities is the elimination of
artificial means of pitching, par-
ticularly the spitball and the
shineball. The claim is made
that this form of ball is detri-
mental to the game and is un-
necessary. The law covering
runners from third base to home
on sacrifice flies is also to be
brought up. When the 1920 sea-
son opens there should be a num-
ber of improvements in the na-
tional game.

A very exciting and even-
ly-matched series of games is hoped
for by officials of the Pacific Coast
Hockey Association this season.
Now all the players have been
selected for the various teams it
is seen that the aggregations all
have good men. In a few weeks
the boys will begin to get in
training for the season which
opens shortly after Christmas.

Willie Hoppe is indeed a veteran
billiard player. He has defended
his world champion billiardist
title in seven tournaments and
countless matches and today is as
strong as ever. He does not yet
show signs of weakening after
being champion for over fifteen
years. He has only been defeated
twice in that time, once each by
Ora Morningstar and Jake Schae-
ffer. He originally won the title
in Paris from the French cham-
pion, Vignaux, fifteen years ago.

Soccer football promises to
have its greatest season in the
United States this year. Football
is a game that has never assumed
the popularity in America that it
has always enjoyed in England.
It now looks as if it had come to
stay in the country and may per-
haps rival baseball as a national
pastime. There are three reasons
advanced for the growing popu-
larity of the game in the states—
the first is that the American boys
while overseas learned to play the
game and understand it more
thoroughly from their British
compadres in war, second, the
Americans in recent engagements
with continental teams have made
wonderful showing, and third, the
game is now under clean and en-
ergetic management in the states
which it has never been before.

TORONTO, Nov. 5.—Following
recent agitation, members of the
Great War Veterans in Ontario
will be given an opportunity in
the near future to vote on the
proposal that the veterans enter
politics, notwithstanding that it
was voted down at the Windsor

showing, the Minister observes
that advantage accrued by the
amendments to war relief legis-
lation in such cases as those not
affecting soldiers.

Moreover, co-operation has
been the keynote of the Forest
Branch and mention is made of
the fact that the Department
keeps in the closest touch with the
related industries as a whole.
Joint committees of representa-
tives of lumber industry and for-
estry officials have been formed
and meet regularly to discuss
scaling, log export, market ex-
tension and so on.

Timber Royalties.

Illuminating, too, are the
figures quoted for revenue from
timber royalties. In 1915 the
revenue reached the sum of \$440,-
000; in 1918, \$831,000 was the
amount. As an instance of revenue
from Crown timber sales, the
summer of 1915 represented a
cut of 56,000,000 feet with a
revenue of \$87,561. This sum-
mer the cut increased to 108,000,-
000 feet, but the revenue leapt to
\$271,407. In other words, three
times the revenue from twice the
quantity of timber is the essence
of the comparison noted.
