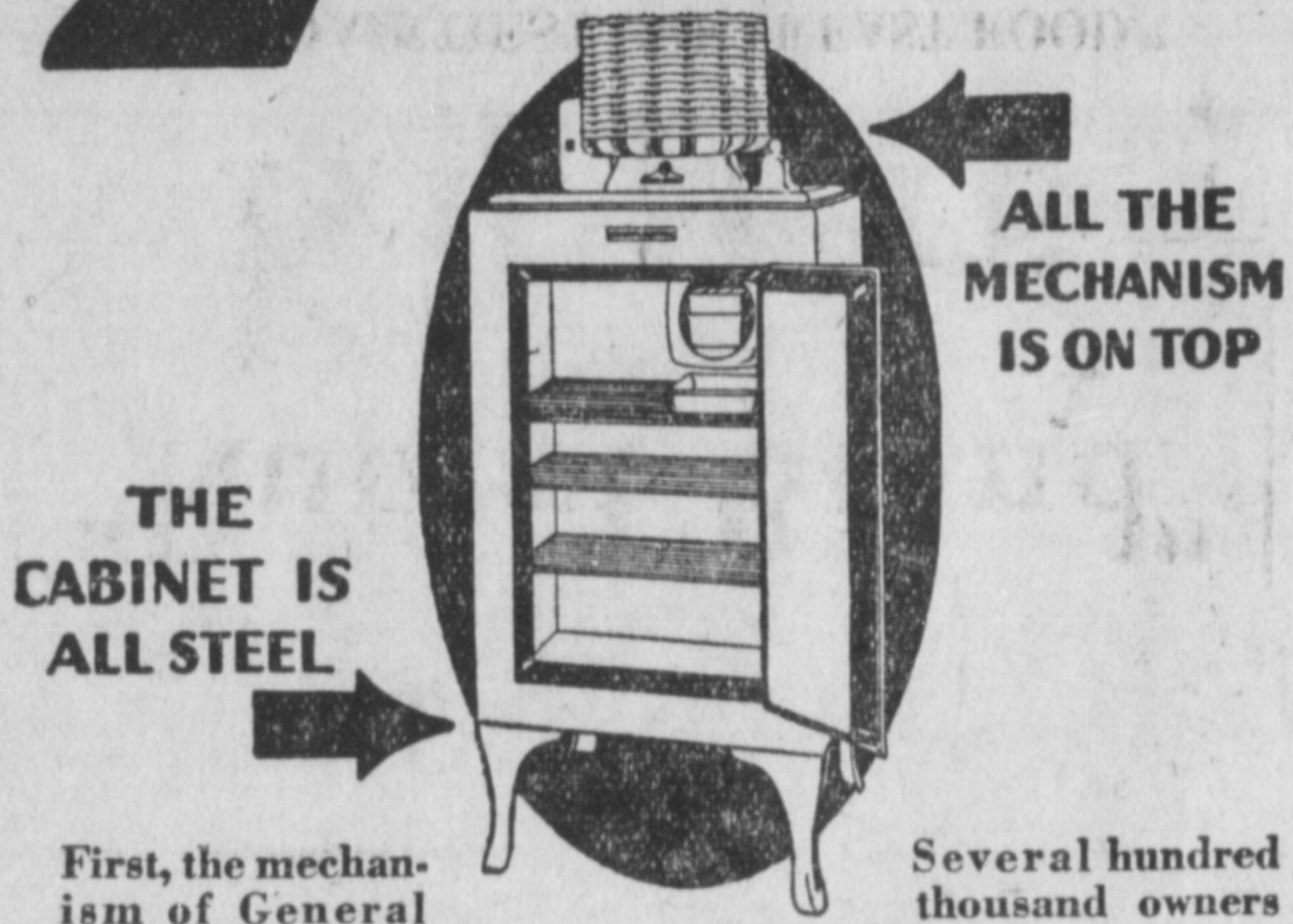

MEETING IS ADJOURNED

Larger Attendance Hoped For Tomorrow at Second Gathering on Post Office Question

In the hope that there will be better attendance in response to the second call, another public meeting is being set for tomorrow night in order to launch the movement for a new federal building in Prince Rupert and a street mail delivery. For a number of reasons, there was not a very large attendance at the meeting called last evening so it was considered advisable to adjourn to Thursday and, in the meantime, have the second gathering adequately advertised. D. C. McRae was elected chairman for last night's meeting and H. F. Glassey, secretary.

Government Agent C. L. Monroe, in making the suggestion that the meeting adjourn, stated that last night's gathering could hardly be called a representative enough one to deal with a question of such importance.

Ald. W. M. Brown thought there should be at least 100 persons in attendance if the citizens were really serious in their desire for a new Post Office building.

S. C. Thomson thought that the people could not really want a new building, else there would be a larger attendance.

Perhaps it was due to the fact that the meeting had not been sufficiently advertised that there was not a larger attendance, D. C. McRae suggested.

After further discussion, it was decided to adjourn the meeting until tomorrow evening, H. W. Birch and C. L. Monroe offering the motion to this effect.

A resolution setting forth Prince Rupert's claims to a more adequate federal building and petitioning the government to take immediate steps toward the erection of same to be ready for occupancy at the expiry of the present lease had been prepared for submission to last night's meeting but, in view of the decision to adjourn, was not presented.

In Prince Rupert

April 16, 1910

These candidates are Fred Stork, for mayor, and Dr. A. A. McIntyre, George R. Naden, H. H. Clarke, W. P. Lynch, F. H. Mobley, J. H. Hilditch, A. R. Barrow and M. M. Stephens.

J. W. Stewart of Foley, Welch & Stewart is in town in the course of a trip of inspection to railway building operations. He reports that about 2000 men are now on the payroll and, as soon as navigation opens up the Skeena River, this force will be about doubled.

The steamer Rupert City, under command of Capt. Duncan McKenzie, is in port on her first trip of the season north from Vancouver. The vessel brought 91 passengers and 500 tons of general freight.

REPAIRS TO FAIR BLDG.

Roof Must Be Covered With Asphalt and New Entrance Badly Needed

The fair board has before it the problem of covering the roof of the exhibition building with asphalt and also of building a new entrance to the structure to replace the old one that is in a bad state of repair. George Casey, on behalf of a committee that inspected the building in company with James Steen, stated that Mr. Steen recommended the sweeping off of the loose gravel, covering the roof with a coat of asphalt and over this fine sand. In addition he recommended covering the dormers with sheet iron.

After some discussion it was decided to refer the matter back to the committee to draw up specifications and submit the tenders to the board.

On the question of the need of a new entrance, a plan was submitted by the committee at an estimated cost of \$150 but this was not considered suitable as the steps were much too narrow. The committee will again look into the matter and decide definitely whether to repair the old entrance or build a new one. If a new one is built it will lead straight down instead of turning as at present.

HINTS FOR GARDENERS

THE PERENNIAL BED

"For the best results in keeping down weeds in perennial or shrubbery borders," writes Professor A. H. Tomlinson of the Ontario Agricultural College, "it is necessary in the growing season to use a hoe quite frequently. A Dutch or flat hoe is shaped something like a large square chisel attached to a wooden handle and in doing this work the hoe is pushed from the operator and is easily handled. The ordinary hoe is liable to go too deep and usually much more time in hoeing would have to be spent than with a Dutch hoe.

"With a perennial border the plants grown should be allowed to become thick and if this does not happen with the plants already established the seeds of annuals may be sown in vacant spaces, including Shirley Poppies, California Poppies, Portulaca, Gypsophila elegans and, for the front, Sweet Alyssum. Annuals may be set out by way of seedlings about the end of May and may consist of Petunias, Verbenas, Phlox drummondii, Asters, Clarkia and so forth. Gladiolus may be planted in the perennial border or even among shrubbery if there is enough light."
