

#### VENICE, March 12: — Charity Increase In Mill Rate Without Any Increase In Gross Amount Taxes Seems Likely This Year

Informal Meeting of City Council Wrestles For Three Hours With Financial Problem and Intimates That 49 Mill Rate Expected

For three hours last night the city council in informal session wrestled with the estimates for the year, paring wherever possible in their endeavor to keep the mill rate down. In spite of that it looks as if the rate would be 49 mills on the dollar or pretty close to that. The general lowering of the assessment this year has reduced the income from general taxes while the increase in school expenditure has added about a mill.
