If the increased Canadian tariff was permanent, the result would be a rapid increase in production in Canada and exports from New Zealand would cease in about three



Edson L. Pease, Who Died in France Today, Was Vice-President of Royal Bank

MONTREAL, Dec. 29-Edson S Pease, vice-president of the Royal Bank of Canada, died today in Nice. France, where he was wintering. He had reached a great age and had been in failing health for some time. For many years he was a prominent figure in Canadian financial affairs although illhealth in recent years had interfered with his activities.
