KING SALMON ARE NOT AS LARGE AS THEY FORMERLY WERE

An Alaska mild-cure operator who has recently returned from the Baranof Island district reports that considerable alarm is felt in that vicinity in regard to the increased percentage of small fish caught there this season as compared to previous years. Although the mild cure pack has been on about the same scale as last year in the Barandof district it has been estimated that out of every hundred King Salmon caught only ten weighed over twenty pounds while the balance average around eight pounds each. As a result large quantities of fish are destroyed which are left in the water, would develop to a profitable size.

One of the packers makes the statement that hundreds of tons of these fish have been dumped outside of Baranof Island this season.

Another believes that fishermen and packers should get together and make some agreement whereby the tremendous waste which is now in progress will be permanently stopped. He says: "I have seen fishermen come in with hundreds of fish and only dispose of about twenty of them in which case the balance had to be dumped. As an example of the change which has taken place within the past few years take for instance Forrester Island. Here we used to get an average of 50 fish to the tierce while now they run as high as 150 to the tierce."

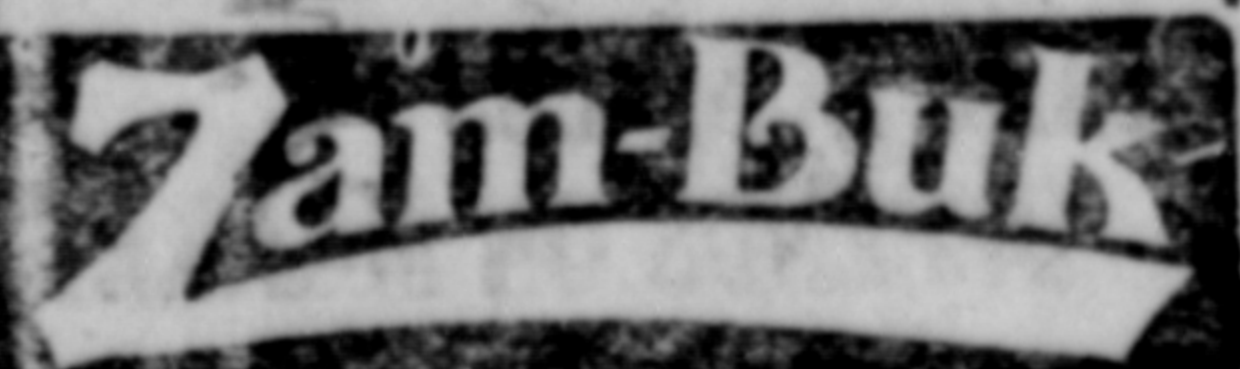
