


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Prince Launches Ship



Defore an immense gathering, H. R. H. the Prince of Wales launch-D ed the 42,000-ton Canadian Pacific liner Empress of Britain, largest steamship in the British Empire, from the Clydebank yards, June 11. The picture, snapped as the huge vessel had just taken the water, was transmitted to this continent by radio a few seconds later. Millions of listeners-in from all parts of the world heard the Prince make the address at the launching and also the address of E. W. Beattty, chairman and president of the Canadian Pacific Railway, who followed His Royal Highness.
