**NEW ORE IS FOUND**

Good Values Shown at Greater Depth in Molybdenum Property at Alice Arm

Officials of the Dalhousie Mining Co. Ltd. announce that progress on the new tunnel at the Tidewater Molybdenum mine, Alice Arm, has been exceptionally satisfactory and that additional ore has been encountered.

This ore, it is stated, was struck at 100 feet below former levels and lies in two veins which were cross-cut at distances of 100 feet and 105 feet from the tunnel mouth. Both veins show good values, says the report, and indicate that the ore body is as large and rich as was believed when this work was commenced a short time ago when the new discovery was made.

The company intends to drift along one of these veins towards indications of much larger values before continuing to work on the tunnel.

The work now being done followed the discovery a short time ago of what is described as a sensational new body of ore containing molybdenum, of which over 100 pounds was sent immediately to the Mines Department at Ottawa for a mill test. The present operations are regarded as giving very pleasing results by the company.

**WELL KNOWN GIRL DEAD**

Daughter of Lieut. Col. J. W. Warden, Passes in East

Many old comrades and friends throughout British Columbia will learn with regret of the sad news of the death of Miss Florence Warden, youngest daughter of Lieut. Col. John W. Warden, D.S.O., O.B.E., V.D., and Mrs. Warden, which took place at the family residence, 463 Janette St., Windsor, Ont., after a lingering illness of some months, and at the early age of 22.

The accomplished young lady was a member of an old United Empire Loyalist family, and was well known in the west where she received her education in city schools and at West Vancouver, where her father was one of the pioneer aldermen. She is survived by her parents and two sisters. The remains are being taken from Windsor to St. John, N.B., for interment at the old family home.

Her father, Col. Warden, was formerly a well known British Columbia resident, and had a brilliant career during the war. Although suffering from wounds received at the Second Battle of Ypres while serving with the "Old 7th," he returned to British Columbia and in 1915, raised the 102nd Battalion, "North British Columbians," and afterwards commanded them at Regina Trench, Vimy, and Passchendaele. Later he was second in command of the famous "Hush Hush" force in the Far East, and still later commanded the Russian Officers training school in Siberia. He is now Honorary Lieutenant Colonel of the "North British Columbia Regiment" at Prince Rupert.

In 1921 he unsuccessfully contested the constituency of Vancouver City in the provincial elections.

Employee of Jasper Park Lodge to Take Lois Moran's Place

JASPER PARK LODGE, June 26:—Chosen to double for Lois Moran, Fox Film star, who for the past two weeks has been on location in Jasper National Park with the Fox Film party making the "Red Sky," Miss Betty Smith, of Toronto, an employee of Jasper Park Lodge, left here yesterday for Mount Robson.

It was originally planned that the film party would visit Mount Robson but much interior work has yet to be done for the picture so Miss Smith was asked to double for Lois Moran in the Robson scenes. Four members of the film party, including camera and property men and Miss Rita, McGibbon, accompanied her.

"Thrilled," is the word Miss Smith used when asked how she would like to double for the film star. With blonde hair, blue eyes and very little difference in height, Miss Smith bears some resemblance to the pretty star.

They will spend two days in the Mount Robson area, "shooting" the monarch of the Canadian Rockies, Berg Lake, Tumbling Glacier and the adjacent country.
