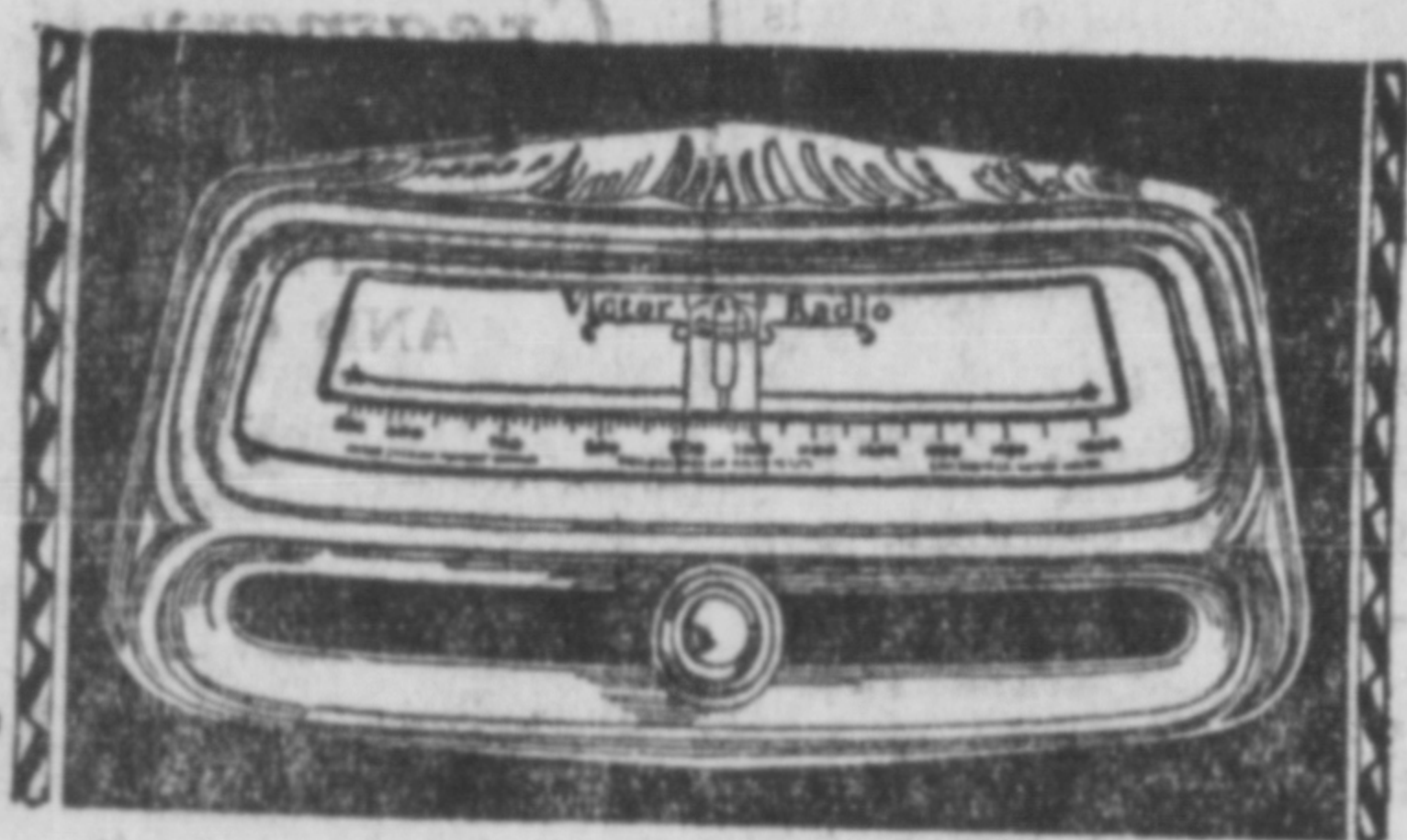
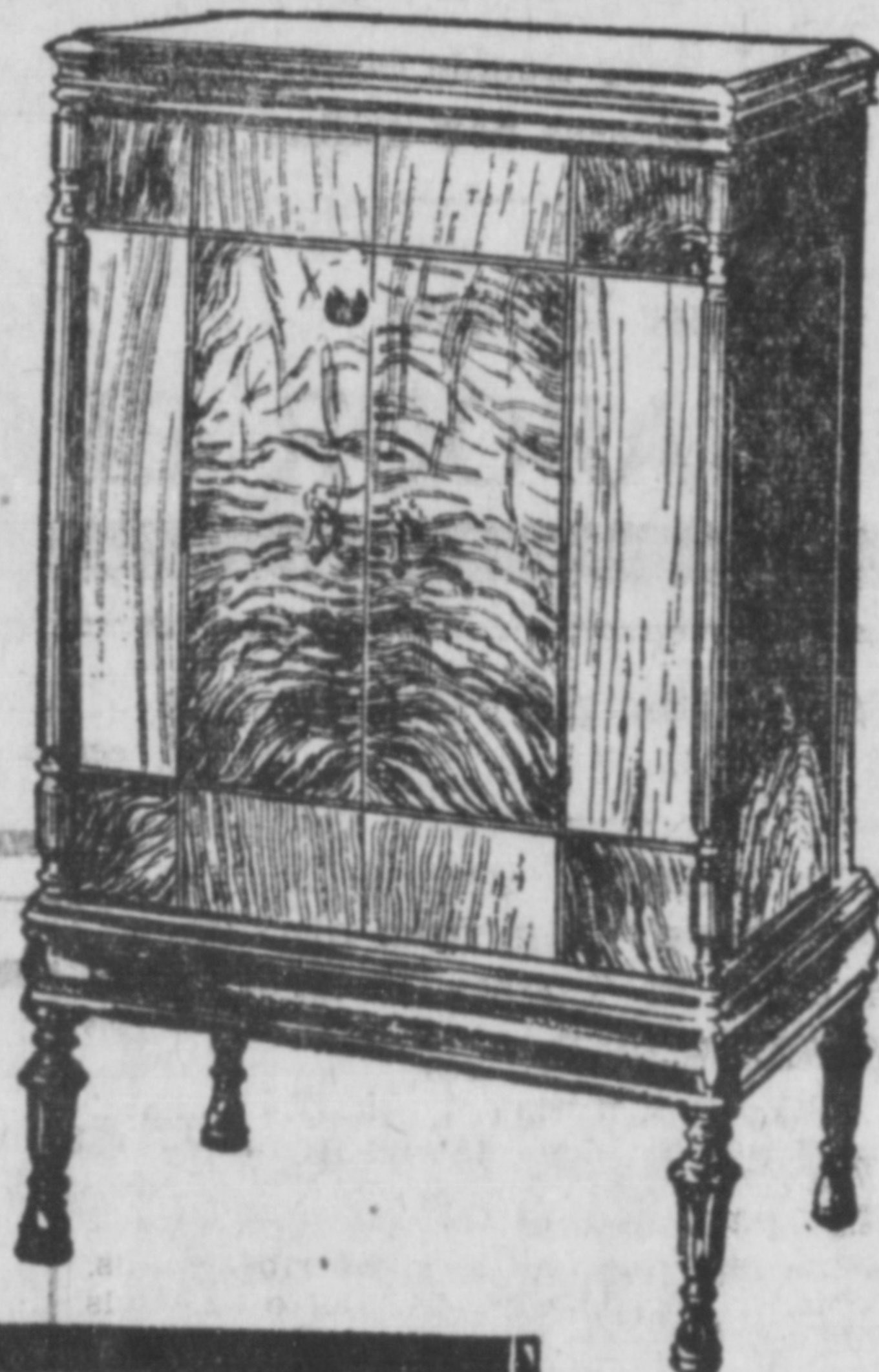

JUMBO DAVIES HARD HITTER

Victoria Boy Hailed as Being Vicious Two-Fisted Fighter

Jumbo Davies of Victoria, who meets Frankie Neel of this city in the 10-round main event of the exhibition show to be held at the Exhibition Building on June 24, is looked upon by Northwestern boxing critics as one of the most promising members of the cauliflower craft to be produced in this section of the Pacific Coast since Jimmy McLarnin stepped into top notch company.

The flaxen haired battler is a vicious two-fisted fighter whose body punching tactics have made him one of the most feared bantams in the game. Jumbo has also demonstrated on numerous occasions that he can assimilate all kinds of punishment. In several of his fights he has been floored two or three times in succession and always came back fighting harder than ever.

In his recent fight with Jackie Caston, Seattle's vest pocket Hercules, Jumbo took everything that the hard hitting Caston shot his way during the first two rounds and the huge crowd of 9,000 fans were speculating on when he would drop to the floor for the count. When Jumbo stepped out for the third round with his vicious body attack, the big audience went frantic as they witnessed Caston showing signs of weakening. The fans marvelled at the punching power of this frail looking fighter, who, at the commencement of hostilities looked like a set-up for the rugged Seattle champion. Caston lost the decision and took such a beating that he had to cancel a couple of matches set for the following week.

Since this defeat of Caston, Northwestern bantam champ, at Seattle two weeks ago, Davies' services have been greatly in demand and Prince Rupert is fortunate in getting him first.

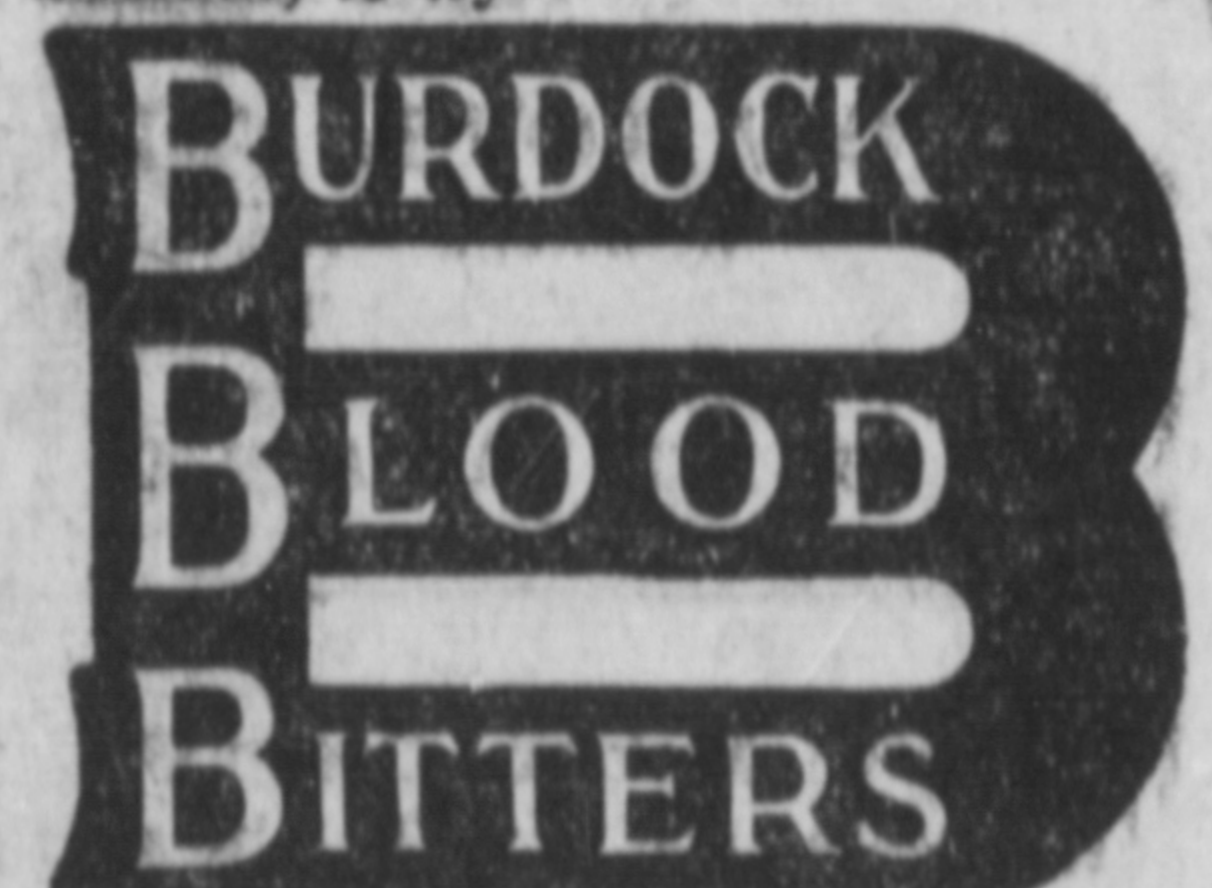

SOCKEYE FISHING STARTED

Same Number of Canneries at Last Year In This District

The season for fishing of sockeye salmon will start at midnight tonight at which time the use of 5 1/4-inch mesh nets in fishing operations will become permissible on the coast. This will be the signal for the opening of the canning season. Operations in the canneries will commence as soon as the fish start to arrive. About the same number of canneries are expected to operate on the Naas and Skeena Rivers this summer as did last year.

The weekly close season for all salmon fishing operations will be for a duration of 48 hours from 6 p.m. Fridays until 6 p.m. Sundays.

INDIAN IS DROWNED

George Denny, Aged 17, Port Simpson, Lost Life Yesterday

George Denny, 17-year old son of Port Simpson and member well known native family there, drowned at Inverness Cannery o'clock yesterday afternoon.

The father and mother went up to a cabin to settle effects and the boy and the girls were still at the boat, the of which was tied to a float, the stern still out. Young Denny was attempting to haul in the when the mooring rope broke and he fell into the water. Unable to swim, he immediately went and drowned. Ten minutes the body was recovered but he was extinct.

The body was brought here and an inquiry held last night, the death being established by Coroner C. L. Monroe. The body were taken out again to Inverness today whence they will go to Simpson for burial.
