Minute Creature That Causes Yellowness in Halibut Doubles Its Number Every 20 Minutes

Of the eight animals, two are the islands. They were picked up wild from the national park and are three and four years old except one which is two years old. The males are shed of their antlers at this time of the year. They will be liberated either at Skidegate or Queen Charlotte City after which

During the train trip they were foddered with green feed and prairie wool. Mr. Davison reports that, despite their strange surroundings, all had good appetites with the exception of one which had to be given an appetizer of salt.

While on the islands, Game Warden Martin will interview as many of the white and native population as possible for the purpose of seeking their co-operation in seeing that the animals are carefully preserved. If the elk and deer thrive and multiply, hunting of them may be permitted in some future year.
