City accounts for the two weeks ending February 14 and totalling \$16,395 were passed for payment at last night's council meeting.

James Travis, field inspector in the Department of Agriculture, has been appointed assistant agriculturalist at Pouc Coupe by the provincial government.

Appointment is announced in the B. C. Gazette of C. A. Brynildsen as deputy mining recorder for the Bella Coola and Omineca mining division with sub-recording office at Bella Coola.

Charles G. Jones, Gold Bar; James Ross, Hudson Hope; and Donald MacDougall, Hudson Hope, have been appointed commissioners under the Provincial Elections Act, the B. C. Gazette announces.

On recommendation of the board of works and the city engineer, the city council decided last night to replace two back cushion tires on a Day-Elder truck at an estimated cost of \$215.

The city council last night made a special grant, at request of the city engineer, of \$300 in order to carry out some repairs to the streets made necessary on account of recent heavy snows. The grant was made on motion of Ald. Brown, seconded by Ald. Rudderham.

Estimates of the school board for 1930 totalling \$80,350 were presented to the city council at last night's meeting. Included in the school estimates is an item of \$1700 to provide for medical inspection of school children with full time assistance of a graduate nurse.

Fred Stephens had a letter before the city council last night suggesting some sort of courtesy on the part of the city to a Great West Life Assurance Co. party which will be here on March 2, enroute to Victoria to attend a convention. Similar letters have been sent to the Board of Trade and other bodies. On motion of Ald. Pullen, seconded by Ald. Macdonald, the council decided to cooperate in any courtesies that may be extended to the party.

Union steamer Catala, Capt. A. E. Dickson, returned to port at 10:40 this morning from Anyox, Stewart and other northern points and sailed at 1:30 p.m. for Vancouver and waypoints.

Capt. N. P. Hocking, master of the Canadian National Steamships freighter Canadian Winner, which is tied up for the winter in the local dry dock, sailed this afternoon on the Catala for Vancouver.

The city council last night finally reconsidered and adopted bylaws providing for the year's indemnity for mayor and aldermen and for the temporary borrowing from the Royal Bank of Canada of \$150,000.

Father E. M. Leray, O.M.I. of Stewart arrived in the city on the Catala this morning from the north and will proceed on tomorrow morning's train to Terrace where next Sunday he will conduct monthly services of the Roman Catholic Church.

The beer licence applications of the Canada and National Hotels at Prince George have been under discussion in the legislature, questions having been asked by I. A. Mackenzie, M. L. A. for North Vancouver. In the former case, the licence was granted and in the latter denied. Mr. Mackenzie desired to know the reasons.

Olof Hanson, who returned to the city on Sunday from a trip south, during the course of his trip, attended a convention of the American Cedarmen's Association in Spokane. The gathering lasted four days and was attended by lumber men from all parts of the United States and Canada. Mr. Hanson, who was accompanied by Mrs. Hanson, also visited Portland, Seattle, Victoria and Vancouver.

On recommendation of the finance committee, the city council decided last night to sell to the Masonic Order a \$1000 Prince Rupert bond, maturing May 1, 1932, to yield 5.9% at the rate of \$100.23. Ald. Theo Collart, chairman of the finance committee pointed out that it was the custom of the city to sell bonds to local citizens when they applied for them.

The B. C. Gazette announces the appointment of Charles Tucker of Premier as a justice of the peace.

Father M. Chartier, O.M.I. of Anyox, arrived in the city on the Catala this morning from the north for a brief visit in town.

Inspector William Spiller, provincial police, who has been on a week's trip to Victoria on official duties, will return to the city on the Prince Rupert tomorrow morning.

George McAfee, manager of the Big Bay Lumber Co., sailed by the Catala this afternoon for a trip to Vancouver, being accompanied by his daughter, Miss Jean McAfee.

Olier Besner this afternoon delivered a report which has been current locally to the effect that he had purchased the Belmont Hotel at the corner of Granville and Davie Streets in Vancouver.
