CITIES TO BE HELPED

Vancouver Gets Substantial Assistance From Government On Unemployment Relief

VANCOUVER, Oct. 4:—A grant of \$100,000 will be made immediately to the city by the provincial government as a refund for a portion of Vancouver's expenditure for relief of unemployment during the first six months of the year. This was announced by Mayor W. H. Malkin following a conference of city council representatives with Premier Tolmie and Hon. N. S. Lougheed, minister of public works, yesterday.

ASK LIGHT ON ROCKS

Tender Sent in Last Summer But Nothing Heard of It Since

The Chamber of Commerce last evening passed a resolution asking the Marine Department of the federal government to proceed with the light needed at Butterworth Rocks. Paul Armour drew attention to the fact that his firm had tendered for this work last summer and given a very low tender, since then nothing had been heard of it and he felt there were influences working against this port. The concrete for the tower would cost about \$4,000 and the light itself about \$2,000.

WILL OPEN POWER LINE THIS MONTH

Plans Being Laid For Formal Event To Take Place at End of October

The opening of the power plant is likely to take place toward the end of this month, according to J. J. Little, manager of the Northern B. C. Power Co., who spoke in regard to the matter at the dinner of the Chamber of Commerce last night, G. P. Tinker presiding. Mr. Little told of the various sections of the work, all of which were nearing completion. Most of it should be complete in from ten days to two weeks. He thought the formal opening would probably take place before the end of the month when Mayor Orme would press the button at Falls River which would set the plant in motion.

IMPERIAL CONFERENCE REQUESTED TO TAKE UP SITUATION OF SILVER VANCOUVER, Oct. 4:—The Vancouver Board of Trade has cabled Premier R. B. Bennett in London asking him to bring before the Imperial Conference the question of the advisability of standardizing the price of silver. The suggestion that the silver situation be taken up at the Imperial Conference emanated from the Smithers' Board of Trade and the proposal was approved at the recent convention of the Associated Boards of Trade of Central British Columbia.

ST. LOUIS CARDINALS TAKE THEIR FIRST WORLD SERIES VICTORY TODAY BY 5-0 SCORE

ST. LOUIS, Oct. 4:—St. Louis Cardinals retrieved themselves for their two losses at Philadelphia earlier in the week by defeating the Philadelphia Athletics five to nothing in the third game of the World Series today. A wild throng of St. Louis baseball fans crowded Sportsmen's Field to see Wild Bill Hallahan, pitching his first game in the series, hold the Mackmen to a few scattered hits while his own team mates crashed out heavy clouds to say nothing of Taylor Douthit's husky homer in the fourth. The Red Birds had to come home to his for more than one of them made their first hit of the series. Connie Mack used three pitchers in the vain effort to stop the Cardinals' batting spree. Gus Walberg started in the box for the Athletics followed by Bill Shores and Jack Quinn, but it was no use for the Cardinals started hitting in the fourth and made their last run in the eighth.

ALL BOATS FORFEITED

Mr. Justice Martin Delivers Judgment Regarding Trollers Seized on Q.C.I.

VICTORIA, Oct. 4:—In Admiralty Court, Mr. Justice Archer Martin delivered judgment declaring forfeited to the crown the three American trolling boats Sunrise, Tillie M. and Queen City which were captured by the fisheries patrol cruiser Rividis in Canadian waters off the Queen Charlotte Islands. Previously, Mr. Justice Martin had ordered the troller May forfeited.

DOCTORS IN CITY

Prominent Medics to Lecture Local Members of Profession Tonight

Dr. R. J. Rudolf, professor of therapeutics, medical school, Toronto University; Dr. F. R. Scott, surgeon of Toronto, and Dr. Gordon O. Matthews, Vancouver, pediatrician, accompanied by C. J. Fletcher, executive secretary of the British Columbia Medical Association, arrived in the city on the Prince Rupert this morning from Vancouver to conduct post-mural lectures for local doctors. The lectures will take place in the Prince Rupert General Hospital tonight and the medical party will proceed Monday morning by train to Prince George.

The lecture tour in the course of which the doctors are here is under the auspices of the Sun Life Assurance Co. of Canada with the co-operation of the Canadian and British Columbia Medical Associations.

In connection with the visit of the doctors, the annual meeting of the Prince Rupert Medical Society will take place at dinner this evening.

Dr. Matthews and Mr. Fletcher, after the trip through the interior, will return to the city next Thursday on their return to Vancouver.

Home Was Nearly Burned Friday

Basement of Conductor and Mrs. Murphy's House Was In Flames Yesterday Afternoon

Conductor and Mrs. D. E. Murphy, 241 Fifth Avenue West, were fortunate that their home was not destroyed by fire which broke out about 1:30 yesterday afternoon. Before anyone was aware of it, the whole basement was in flames and dense smoke was pouring from the house. When the fire department arrived, the basement was blazing like a furnace but the conflagration was immediately brought under control with little damage except to the basement in which some trunks and other effects were burned. The origin of the blaze is uncertain although the fire department believes it may have started either from defective wiring or hot ashes.
