DARING ROBBERY IN SOUTHERN B.C.

BURKE REACHED DESTINATION; LEFT ON RETURN FLIGHT

Bandits Took \$10,000 From Store in Fraser Valley But Dropped It

Quiet Little Town of Murrayville Scene of Hold-Up—Loot Is Recovered But Robbers Are Still At Large

NEW WESTMINSTER, Oct. 30.—Four bandits this morning smashed the safe and robbed the store of P. Y. Porter at Murrayville of \$10,000 in stocks and bonds and \$300 in cash, drove away in a stolen car, shot their way through a police guard at the Fraser River and finally took refuge in Queen's Park. They dropped the loot in their flight and it was recovered.

That was evident, Mr. Pattullo declared, by the government's action in discontinuing service on the North Vancouver section.

The package left behind by the absent-minded fare contained jewels valued at approximately \$6,000. In the second instance, a driver found that a passenger had left \$5,000 in bank notes in his cab. He drove to the nearest police station."

GAIN FOR LIBERALS

Took One Seat Away From Conservatives In Four Ontario By-Elections

TORONTO, Oct. 30.—One Liberal gain from the Conservatives and three Conservative seats unchanged is the result of yesterday's voting in four by-elections for the Ontario legislature.

Lanark, South Nipissing and Perth South elected government candidates while Waterloo South was redeemed by the Liberals, N. O. Hipel obtaining a majority of about 100 over M. M. Donald.

E. R. Stedman was elected in Lanark, Charles Harrison in South Nipissing and Charles Richardson in Perth South.

COMMITTED FOR TRIAL

Louis Wesley and John Morrison Sent On Theft From the Person Charge

Louis Wesley and John Morrison, charged with theft from the person of Andy Gavin in a downtown hotel on Tuesday night, were committed for trial by Magistrate McClymont in city police court this morning. It is alleged that Wesley and Morrison entered Gavin's room and forcibly relieved him of a watch as well as cash.

Andy Gavin, the man who was alleged to have been robbed, was the chief witness against Wesley and Morrison. He declared that Wesley had entered his room by way of the transom and opened the door from the inside for Morrison. The pair then relieved him forcibly, Gavin declared, of a watch and two dollars or so which they took from his pockets. Gavin testified that it had been necessary to call a doctor to examine him for a twisted arm and a throat which was still sore as a result of Morrison having "loved him."

Witness stated that he was lying on top of his bed when Wesley made entrance by way of the transom. He had not had time to interfere before Wesley unlocked the door. He (witness) was not under the influence of liquor but Morrison was. As he was being assaulted witness said he screamed: "Help! Police! Murder!" The proprietor soon arrived on the scene and the police were called.

Sergeant W. J. Service, who conducted the prosecution, stated he was prepared to admit that Gavin was under the influence of liquor. That was no excuse for the other men robbing him.

Morrison denied that he had taken either watch or money from Gavin. Wesley disclaimed Gavin's statement that he had entered the room by way of the transom, that he had opened the door or that he started to choke Gavin.

IS FOUND IN RIVER

Body of Cosens Spencer, Missing Since Chilcotin Shooting, Is Discovered

WILLIAMS LAKE, Oct. 30.—The body of Cosens Spencer, 60 years old rancher of Chilcotin, was found in the Chilcotin River yesterday by Little Charlie, an Indian, after a search since September 11 following the shooting to death of Edward Smith, ranch storekeeper, and the wounding of Walter Stoddard, ranch manager.

MORE POWER AT PRINCE GEORGE

Additional Unit Will Be Able to Meet Requirements For Some Years, It Is Expected

PRINCE GEORGE, Oct. 30.—The new unit of the city power station is now in operation and is carrying the full load of the municipal lighting service. The new machine is doing the work that was formerly performed by two smaller ones but for peak-load conditions it may be necessary to throw in one of the smaller machines.

The new unit gives the city an ample power reserve which it is expected will be sufficient to meet all power requirements for a number of years.

ENGINES OF R-101 WERE WORKING WELL PRIOR TO DISASTER

LONDON, Oct. 30.—A page from the log of the ill-fated British dirigible R-101 was introduced into the government's inquiry today to show that the engines of the airship were working smoothly nine minutes before it crashed at Beauvais, France. This sheet had been found near the scene of the disaster.

RAILWAY IN PEACE

Grade From Hythe to Dawson Creek Expected to Be Completed in Two Weeks

GRANDE PRAIRIE, Oct. 30.—John Wickstrand, the contractor in charge of construction of the extension from Hythe to Dawson Creek, stated that the steel was laid to Swan Lake siding. The grade, he said, was practically completed from Swan Lake to Pouce Coupe, as was also the siding at the latter point. It is expected that the grade will be completed from Hythe to Dawson Creek in from 15 to 20 working days. The four big bridges between Swan Lake and Pouce Coupe are being rushed to completion.

THIS PROVINCE FIRST ENTRY

Ladner Farmer First to Enter in Chicago Show

CHICAGO, Oct. 30.—To a British Columbia farmer, W. G. Gibson of Ladner, goes the distinction of having made the first entry from that province to be received for the 1930 international grain and hay show to be held at Chicago November 29 to December 6, in connection with the International Live Stock Exposition.

Gibson's entries which consist of samples of field peas, six-rowed barley, oats, hard red spring wheat, and field beans, will be matched with products of the fields of the farthestmost parts of the world which are sent to compete in this premier crops show. Already for the 1930 event wheat samples have been received from three New South Wales wheat growers.

Gibson won one of the highest honors at the 1929 Grain and Hay Show at Chicago, taking the championship of his sample of field peas, and in the hard red spring wheat class, his sample was high on the award list.

Lee Gordon was the speaker at the weekly luncheon of the Prince Rupert Rotary Club at the Commodore Cafe today. His subject was "The Consumer's Dollar." President S. D. Johnston was in the chair.

Frank Dorbrandt Found Last Trace of Missing Aviator Near Ft. Liard

Search Flyer Himself Forced Down By Gasoline Shortage On Lake Fifty Miles South of Base

ATLIN, Oct. 30.—That Captain E. J. A. Burke, missing Atlin commercial flyer, reached his destination safely and left Liard Post on the return flight to Atlin on October 11, was learned by Frank Dorbrandt who left here on Monday last to search for Burke. Dorbrandt, on his return from Liard, was forced to land on Paddy's Lake, 50 miles south of here, because of shortage of gasoline. Burke was last seen 50 miles from Liard making good progress toward Atlin. The visibility was poor here on October 11. Gasoline is being rushed to Dorbrandt so that he may return here.

Shortage of Women Doctors in England

Not Enough to Fill Vacant Posts Says Dean of Medical School

LONDON, Oct. 30.—There are not enough qualified medical women to fill vacant posts declares Lady Barrett, dean of the London School of Medicine for Women. On this account, she welcomes to the new session of the school the largest entry it has had since 1920.

Miss Chadburn, senior surgeon, South London Hospital for Women, speaking of the need for more women doctors, said marriage is a very real part of women's work, and women played the more important part in married life. "I think it is a monstrous injustice and an insult to women to say that on marriage a woman must retire, or 'No married women need apply.' Such a dictum should produce a strike of all women," says Miss Chadburn. "There is medical work which can be done equally as well by married women as by single women."

'Middle' Men in England Scarce

Supply Not Equal to Demand Says Warden of College

LONDON, Oct. 30.—The supply of well trained young Englishmen for the "middle" positions is not equal to the demand, according to A. H. L. Fisher, a former minister of education, and now warden of New College, Oxford. "We are often told there is plenty of room at the top," said Mr. Fisher at the prize-giving at Bradford College. "That is true, but there is also plenty of room in the middle—room for well educated, well mannered, young Englishmen. They are in great demand, and the supply does not equal the demand."

Boyd and Connor Off to Berlin

Trans-Atlantic Flyers to Pay Visit to Capital City of Germany

CROYDON, England, Oct. 30.—Capt. J. Errol Boyd and Lieut. Harry Connor, trans-Atlantic aviators, left Croydon today in their monoplane Columbia for Berlin.

SECOND IN GOLD YIELD

Canada Promises to Overtake United States This Year

MONTREAL, Oct. 30.—The prospects are that Canada will this year advance into second place among the gold producing countries of the world. South Africa holds first place and the United States second. Last year the value of gold produced in Canada was approximately \$40,000,000. This year it is expected the value will be about \$60,000,000. Almost without exception the larger mines in Northern Ontario, the principal source of gold production in the Dominion are expanding their output. Besides the straight gold producers there are several copper mines that add an important quota of gold as a by-product. Within the next year it is likely that Manitoba will play an important role in gold production.

Charlie Olsen Is Committed

Logger Will Have to Stand Trial on Charge of Wounding With Razor

On a charge of wounding Warren Scott with a razor, Charlie Olsen, logger, was committed for trial by Magistrate McClymont in city police court yesterday afternoon. He will appear before Judge F. McB. Young in County Court shortly for election.

ONLY ONE BOAT IN

The American schooner Helge-land, with 10,000 pounds, was the only halibut boat in this morning. It was expected that she would hold over until tomorrow.

TWENTY-SEVEN KILLED IN ITALIAN 'QUAKE'

ANCONA, Italy, Oct. 30.—Twenty-seven persons are known to be killed and more than 150 are injured as a result of an earthquake which shook the Adriatic Coast of Italy today. It is believed that the casualties in town which had been heard from at midday would appreciably increase the total of casualties.
