

The portal of No. 3 tunnel of the Unicorn is just north of Big Missouri boundary and at an elevation just under 3200 feet. The tunnel is now in some 330 feet and at a point some 170 feet from the portal the porphyry zone coming through from the Big Missouri was first encountered. At 300 feet considerable sulphides were encountered, including a vein of from two to two and a half feet wide which shows considerable free gold apparently in an exactly similar gangue and occurrence as the free gold in the same zone on the Big Missouri. Winter camps, capable of accomodating a small crew of some eight men, are being prepared and it is the intention to operate throughout the coming winter.
