Reporting on conditions in the hospital, Miss Harrison stated that things were rather quiet at present. A class of five new student nurses had entered this month.

Power Increased At Prince George

New Unit Capable of Generating 375 Kilowatts is to Be Installed

PRINCE GEORGE, Oct. 16.—The city of Prince George is entering into an arrangement with the Canadian National Railways here to supply them with electric power. With the installation of the new unit in the power station, the plant will be capable of generating 375 kilowatts, which would be ample to provide the railway company and leave a margin over the peak load of last year. The new arrangement is expected to increase the earnings of the city plant by \$1250.

Improvements At Hospital

Fracture Table Is Being Secured and Improvements in Lighting of Operating Room Proposed

On recommendation of the house committee, the hospital board decided last night to purchase a fracture table for the institution at a cost of \$336. In speaking to the recommendation, Ald. S. D. Macdonald, who presented the report of the house committee in the absence of Ald. W. M. Brown, the chairman, stated that the fracture table was a long outstanding necessity in the equipment of the hospital. Miss Jean Harrison, lady superintendent, described some of the many uses which could be made of this item of equipment. It was valuable in treating all forms of fractures and made it easier both for patient and doctor. A patient had had to leave the hospital here recently and go to Vancouver for further treatment because there was no fracture table here.

J. H. Thompson, chairman of the board, stated that it had been decided that a fracture table would be of more value in the hospital than a quartz lamp which had been talked about.

After G. P. Tinker, chairman of the finance committee, and H. W. Birch, managing secretary, had both stated that hospital finances could stand the expenditure, it was decided to purchase the fracture table.

Ald. Macdonald also reported on a project for installation of new lighting in the operating room. The new system, it was estimated, would cost about \$445. This matter was referred to the house committee to get figures and will be brought up again at next month's meeting.

A suggestion from Frank Dibb that considerable savings might be effected by replacing old electric light bulbs which had outlived their usefulness with new ones was referred to the house committee.

Hospital Finances

Receipts of the Prince Rupert General Hospital for the month of September amounted to \$6,402.95 while disbursements totalled \$6,658.37, leaving a deficit of \$255.42. It was reported to the hospital board at its meeting last night by G. P. Tinker, chairman of the finance committee. There had been a total of 1880 hospital days during the month at a cost of \$3 per day. A donation of \$2.50 from an anonymous giver was announced.

Harry Schofield, district passenger agent, British Columbia Coast Steamship Services, was a passenger aboard the Princess Louise yesterday afternoon returning to Vancouver after having made the round trip to Skagway on the vessel.
