### PEACE OUTLET

In a single session the Vancouver city council heard of the city's difficulty in making its unemployment relief funds go the distance that will likely be required of them, and passed a resolution asking the Federal Government to press for action on the Peace River railway outlet.

The effect of the resolution is to ask the Bennett Government to give an undertaking that it will procure a definite promise of early action from the railway companies or commence the project as a federal undertaking.

The two subjects of unemployment in the west and the Peace River railway building are logically related.

If money is to be expended in British Columbia for care of the unemployed, how much better it would be to provide constructive, respectable work for single men in this way than to keep them in a breadline or some less essential kind of undertaking in Vancouver.

Cutting of ties, slashing of grade, construction of camps,

etc., can all be carried on in winter.

Vancouver would take a new lease on life with the bare announcement that work would be proceeded with at once on the Peace River railway outlet.
