BORROWING BY CANADA

Dominion Government to Place. \$100,000,000 Issue in United States Market

NEW YORK, Oct. 3:-The Herald Tribune says it understands arrangements for the largest foreign government bond offering to be placed in the United States market this year are virtually completed by a banking group who will make public soon the offering of a new issue of \$100,000,000 of Canadian government four per cent bonds maturing in 30 years.

The transaction, which is to be confined to the United States and Canada markets, would place the Dominion government in funds for important refunding operations late this year and next.
