



### Regiment Won Heilbronner Cup For Rifle Shooting Saturday Evening From Naval Reserve

In competition with teams from the Royal Canadian Naval Volunteer Reserve and the Canadian National Railways, the First North B.C. Regiment won the Heilbronner Cup Saturday evening on the Regiment Miniature Rifle Range. 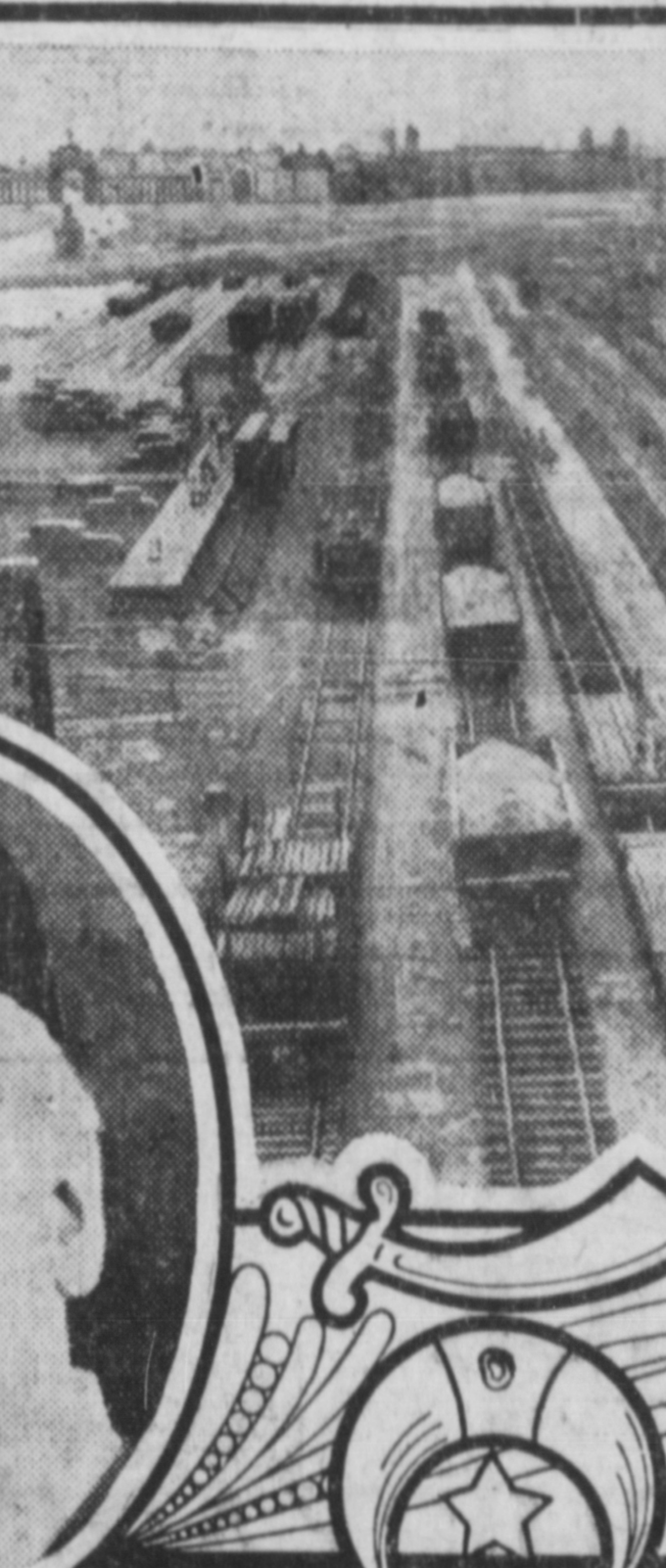
