Important New Means Voice Communication Forecast by Official

Experiments Being Conducted With Radio Talking From Here and Vancouver Has Already Been Got In Touch With

Experiments already made indicate that wireless telephony between Prince Rupert and Vancouver is well within the bounds of possibility and will probably develop into a dependable system as useful to Prince Rupert as it is today to Powell River, according to C. H. McLean, transmission and protection engineer for the B. C. Telephone Company, who is in the city today on the yacht Belmont, doing experimental work. Yesterday when not far from the city he talked with G. H. Halse, chairman of the board of di-

rectors, and this afternoon Mayor Orme and several other local citiens are going out on the Belmont SHORTAGE to make some further tests.

Telling of the work they were doing, Mr. McLean this morning said they were using a short wave of about 50 metres in the day time but a change had to be made at night as conditions changed. It was largely a matter of adjustment and experiment. So far as they could tell now the system would be feasible. They would probably move their southern station north to possibly Port Hardy and from there they thought they could be in con-Rupert. Just now they were making tage is,, however, not serious.
