CORPORAL ROSS PRESENTED WITH A DECORATION

D.C.M. Pinned On Local Man By
Member For District At
Smoker

The smoking concert at the Great War Veterans' rooms last night was a pronounced success. The object of the gathering was to celebrate the signing of the Armistice, yesterday being the first anniversary of the great event. President Simon Dunlop acquitted himself in the chair and kept the programme going in fine style.

During the first part of the programme, the soldier member for the district, Col. C. W. Peck, V.C., was present. He presented the Distinguished Conduct Medal to Corporal Tommy Ross, of the 10th Infantry Battalion. This was probably the biggest feature of the evening and the Colonel expressed the pleasure he felt at being called upon to present a decoration which, to his mind, was the second highest honor for bravery that could be won on the field of battle. Colonel Peck considered it an honor to have been able to serve in the same division with the honored soldier. He mentioned that the 10th and the 16th battalions were the first Canadian battalions to be hurled against the Huns in a hand to hand conflict in the great war. He again congratulated Corporal Ross on the signal bravery which was requisite to the winning of the D.C.M.

After the presentation a delightful programme was given by members and friends while the audience indulged in the smokes that were amply provided for all. "Doc" Clapperton sang an appropriate song, "Admiral's Broom," while J. C. Brady, in his own inimitable style, gave recitations both grave and gay. Frank Moore delighted with a number of humorous songs for which he has gained such popularity. Harry Harvey, with violin solos and songs, Bill Murray, Bob Robertson, Jimmy Kelly, with songs, and Ed. Ross, with a xylophone solo contributed to the programme and were received with due acclaim. W. Vaughan Davies was at the piano, which means that the accompaniments were all that could be desired.

BLACK CASE HEARD IN POLICE COURT

Defendant Declares He was Absolutely Innocent of Having Liquor in Possession.

Peter Black appeared in the Police Court this morning charged with having liquor in his possession other than in a private dwelling. Constable McGlinchy, who made the arrest, was the first witness to give evidence in the case. He told of going into the diningroom of the Central Hotel in the course of his rounds on Monday about dinner time. He discovered some persons at a table drinking the "Pure Quill" and immediately laid his charge.

Peter Black, appearing in his own defence, said that he was just sitting down for supper on that evening when a friend came in with a bottle, which was claimed to have been obtained on prescription. He offered him a drink, out of pure kindness, on the anniversary. Mr. Black said that as far as he was concerned he was absolutely innocent. He could not help if somebody came into his hotel with whiskey. It was common practice for persons to bring liquor into hotel premises. If a hotel keeper threw a man out because he had liquor he might as well go out of business. The evidence of Constable McGlinchy and Mr. Black is all there is on the case which was adjourned till tomorrow morning when the finding will be given.

BAPTISTS HOLD CELEBRATION

Canon Rix Lectures on Democracy of British Government and People

Over seventy members of the Baptist congregation and their friends gathered at the Church Hall last evening to celebrate Armistice Day. Rev. J. B. Rowell presided and gave a short address on Patriotism. Rev. Canon Rix gave an eloquent discourse on "The Democracy of the British Government and People" which was very much appreciated.

Vocal numbers were given by Mrs. McMillan, Miss Edmonds, and Mr. Lancaster with Miss Way at the piano. There was also a violin solo by Mrs. R. B. Lindsay. At the close refreshments were served, the occasion resembling one of the old-time home parties.

At Monday night's city council meeting, Ald.
