Baldwin who was stabbed just above the heart, is recovering.

The steamer Prince Charles will make her final trial trip this weekend on the run between here and Vancouver via Ocean Falls and Stewart and will be replaced next week for the spring by the Prince Rupert which has been undergoing her annual overhaul in Vancouver. It is understood that the Prince Charles will then relieve the Prince John for one trip on the run between here and Vancouver via the Queen Charlotte Islands before being laid up in the local dry dock for annual overhaul preparatory to going on summer schedule.
