Stinging Rebuke to Minister of Finance From Soldier Member; Liberal Proposal Voted Down

VICTORIA, Feb. 14 .- A stinging rebuke to Hon. W. C. Shelly was administered by Col. C. W. Peck, V.C., in the legislature yesterday. "Nobody would stoop to say that Norman Watt would steal \$150 of public money," he asserted. "But the minister of finance did say so." interposed T. D. Pattullo. "I carry no banner for the minister of finance," said Colonel Peck, who is a Conservative member. "The members on this side of the house are associated with me in the determination to see that Norman Watt gets a square deal. Whatever he

did, I am convinced, from my TOOK MONEY acquaintance with him and from TOOK MONEY the testimonials of friends, that he did not commit an intentional fraud on the public treasury.
