**Employment Situation Is Better** In Canada While It Is Not Good In Other Countries, Says Report

WASHINGTON, June 10:-Employment conditions in Canada were improved during April while those in other countries did not show the same turn, according to reports received by the Department of Commerce here.

A report of the department says that the wheat situation in Canada is improving with higher prices and increased shipments.

General trade, however, remains considerably below last year's volume although it compares favorably with 1928. A material improvement is not expected before autumn.

Fortunately, damage reported by the halibut fleet to date is of more or less minor extent and no loss of boats or lives is reported although there have been arduous experiences and some narrow escapes.

The stove was broken and the boat lost some of her upperworks including pipe veil and lights. The Arne, Heavy Rains which sold her catch here, will proceed to Seattle for repairs.
