

### NEGOTIATIONS New Fishery Regulations of Provincial Government Were Discussed Here Last Evening

At a dinner given last night by Fred Mathers of the B. C. Packers to representatives of the Board of Trade, the city council and the fishermen, there was a long discussion in regard to the new regulations recently promulgated by Hon. S. L. Howe. Mr. Mathers made the opening address, explaining the regulations, and Charles Lord, for the fishermen, laid their case before the gathering. Acting Mayor Collart presided and many expressed their views. Mr. Mathers said in part:

"Prince Rupert is the centre of the '-largest and most productive fishing TO REFE vitally interested in any regulations which pertain to those fisheries.
