## MINES SET NEW RECORD

Canadian Mineral Production in 1929 10% More Than 1928

OTTAWA, Jan. 2.—The mining industry of Canada reached a new high record in 1929 when the value of production amounted to \$303,876,000, or 10% more than in the previous year, according to official estimates.
