The school board, at its regular monthly meeting last night, passed a budget for November totalling \$8,298.91 of which \$767.91 was made up of accounts and \$7531 salaries.

Mrs. G. A. Hunter of this city was the winner of second prize in a recipe competition conducted by the Vancouver Province. There were many entrants from all parts of the province.

Mills, principal of Borden Street School, in her report to the school board at the meeting last night, mentioned that the entrance to the school grounds needed surfacing, several children having already suffered minor hurts as a result of falling on protruding rocks. As it is a city approach, the matter will be referred to the city engineer for attention.

The regular monthly meeting of the Board of School Trustees was held last night. Business was merely of a routine nature and the session lasted only about three-quarters of an hour. The school board last night authorized the secretary to write a letter to the principals of King Edward High School and Booth Memorial School expressing appreciation of members of the board at having been sent complimentary tickets for the forthcoming Christmas entertainment of those schools.

Miss E. A. Mercer, principal of Booth Memorial School, in her report for the month of November presented to the school board at its meeting last night, stated that Armistice Day had been suitably observed in her school. Miss Mercer thanked the board for granting permission to use the school auditorium for the forthcoming Christmas entertainment.
