Yesterday afternoon aboard the launch Belmont, owned by the B. C. Telephone Co., tests were made in regard to the practicability of using raido telephones between Prince Ruert and Vancouver. Mayor Orme, G. P. Tinker, president of the Chamber of Commerce; Lieut. Col. J. W. Nicholls of the Cold Storage; Superintendent Massy of the city utilities, and Alderman H. F. Pullen were present and took part in the experiments.

Colonel Nicholls called up G. H. Halse, chairman of the board of directors of the telephone company, at the Vancouver Club and congratulated him on the success so fari attending the work. The conversation was interrupted by local disturbances but later very successful two-way conversations were carried on with the agent of the company on Lulu Island and the visitors were well satisfied that, with such a good beginning, it was only a matter of a short time before the system would be made workable here.

In the course of conversation, C. H. McLean, engineer in charge of the work, told the Lulu Island man that the Prince Rupert ball team had wiled up the Vancouver Athletics, winning five games straight.


