DISCUSSION IN LEGISLATURE WATT CASE BETWEEN GOVERNMENT REPRESENTATIVES AND OPPOSITION.

not discuss coroner's fees with him at that time. On June 10 he gave a newspaper interview that Watt was dismissed for playing politics. On October 10 he asked the Prince Rupert council if coroner's fees had been paid to Watt on November 8. He asked Mr. Watt for a refund. Two ministers, including Premier Tolmie, today were specifically asked and failed to support Shelly's statement that he had discussed the fee question with the cabinet before going to Prince Rupert. Mr. Shelly today denied using the word "stole." Mr. Manson and other members said they heard it used but would leave the public to judge whether, even if the word was not used, the implication had not been broadcast through the country.
The Barge Case
Following the debate on the Watt case, Mr. Pattullo appealed to Premier Tolmie to clear the name of John L. Barge, 65-year-old sub-agent at Queen Charlotte City, who had been dismissed and charged with appropriating postage stamps and government gasoline. An investigation by William E. Fisher, a strong Prince Rupert Conservative, had held these charges to be proven. Mr. Pattullo said this enquiry cost \$750 but need not have been held as Mr. Barge admitted all the facts alleged and explained the reasons for them. The government had not been defrauded and it was a shame for this fine old pioneer to be smirched. He was sure, if the Premier knew the facts, he would have record expunged. The debate on Mr. Pattullo's motion for a return of documents was adjourned without reply.
