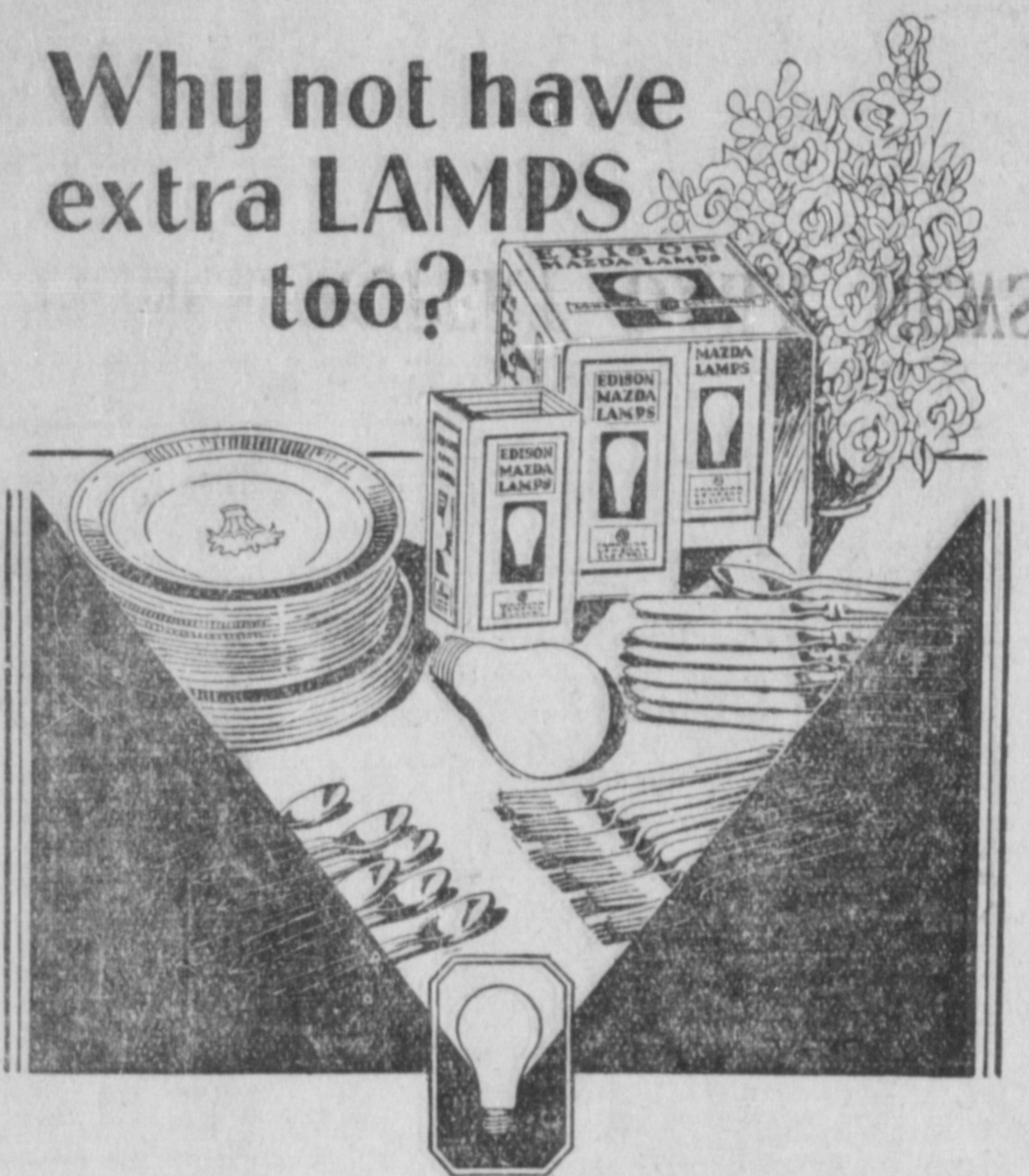

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GREAT NEED OF BUILDING FOR LIBRARY

Magazine Table May Have to Be Excluded to Make Room For Books

Local Library Is Kept Busy

Slight Increase in Number of Books Reported By Librarian at Meeting

At the meeting of the library board last night, Chairman G. V. Wilkinson presiding, the librarian reported a total circulation of books during the month of September of 1,194 or a daily average of 199.7. This was made up of fiction 2644, duplicate pay 152, non-fiction 400 and juvenile 915. There are now 3,063 registered borrowers.

New books were received during the month, 24 by gift and 34 by purchase, but owing to discards the total gain was only 27. The number of volumes now on the shelves and in circulation is now approximately 7,325.

Those present at the meeting in addition to the chairman were Alderman Linzey, Alderman Pullen, Mrs. Kirkpatrick, Frank Dibb, J. J. Gillies and the librarian.
