OPPOSES DRY LAW

Congressman Believes Most States Would Vote Against Prohibition If Both Houses Proposed Amendment

BOSTON, Dec. 31.—Congressman A. Platt Andrew of Gloucester has announced that he will introduce at the present session of Congress a resolution to bring about a national referendum on repeal of the Eighteenth Amendment.

His plan is to have Congress, by a two-thirds vote of both houses, propose to the various states an amendment to the Constitution for repeal of the Eighteenth Amendment, and to provide, for its ratification, state conventions of delegates elected especially for the purpose.

While the result of the total popular vote of the country would not determine the fate of the Prohibition Amendment, Congressman Andrew believed it would clear up the whole situation. He thought the two-thirds vote of the states necessary for repeal would be cast.

At least one dry Republican Congressman of Massachusetts, it was said, would support the Andrew measure, and others stated they wished to read the proposed bill carefully before giving it their support. It is expected that the wet Democratic members of Congress will favor the measure, and that Senator Walsh, of Massachusetts, will support it when it comes before the upper house.

If dry leaders were sincere in stating they favored a national referendum, said Congressman Andrew, and if they supported the bill, the referendum could be carried out within a year, and thereafter regular national and state elections could be held on the direct issues of the campaign and without confusion from the prohibition question.

Mr. Andrew referred to a statement made by Dr. Clarence True Wilson, dry leader, that: "There is nothing I would so like to see as a national referendum, giving every man and woman a vote as to whether the Eighteenth Amendment should be sustained and enforced, or modified or repealed."

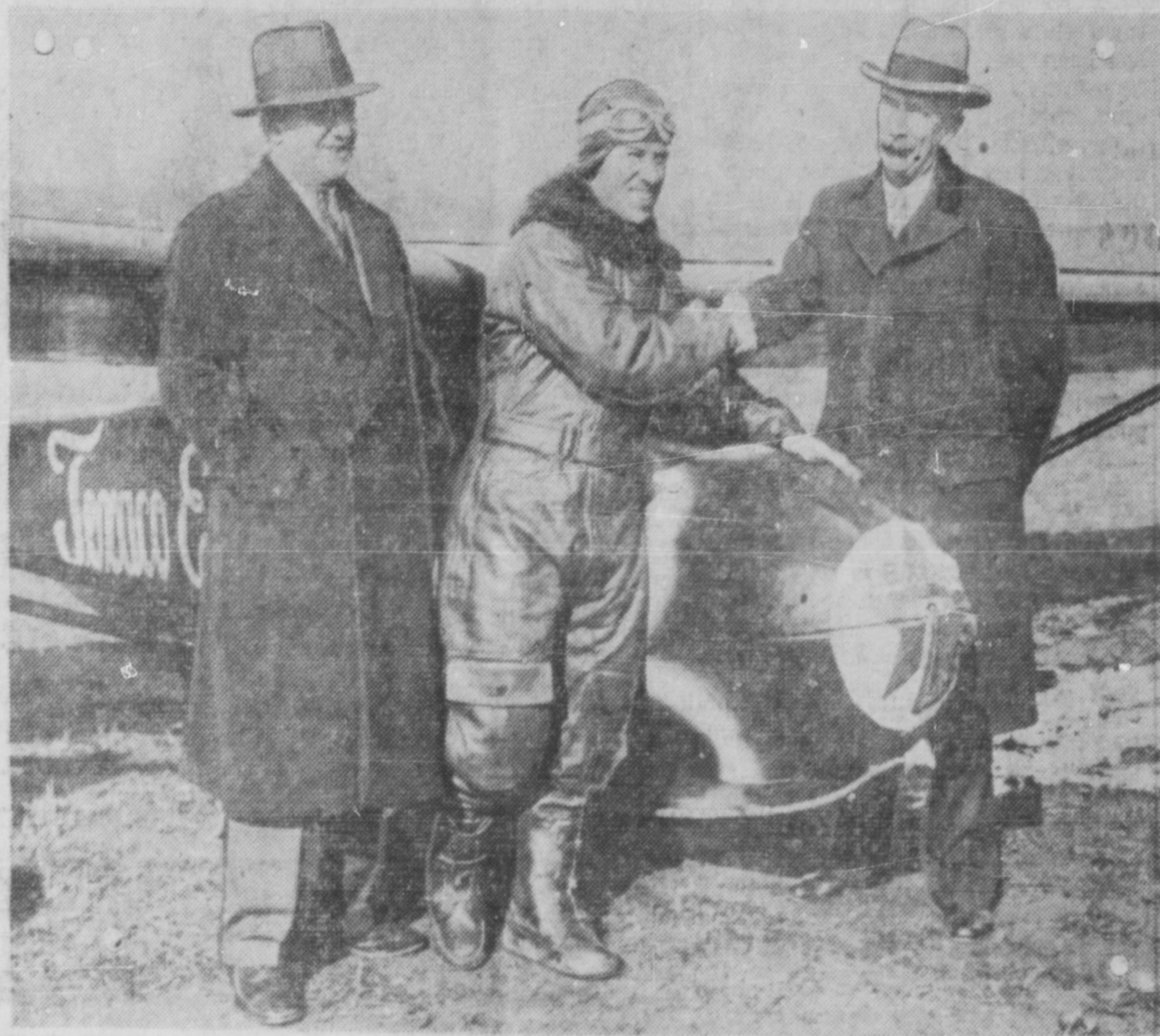

GUILLOTINE IS WORKED

French Executions, However, Are Not So Open As Formerly; New Man in Command

PARIS, Dec. 31.—In connection with the coming retirement of Monsieur Anatole Deibler from the official post of public executioner, in command of the guillotine, the fact that executions in France are still nominally public is impressed upon the people. However, they are not so public nowadays as formerly, for while they are still held in open squares in front of prisons spectators are kept at a distance by ropes, and an early hour is chosen for an execution, so the guillotine at work is no longer the spectacular display it once was. The change has been in effect since 1914.

It is customary when the occupant of an official position in France retires he is given the title of honorary holder of the office, and it is in this sense that Monsieur Deibler will shortly become "Honorary Executioner to the French Republic." It has been announced that he is going out of business and is building a villa in Paris in which he proposes to spend the remainder of his life.

A nephew of Deibler, it is said, will be in command of the guillotine in future. His name is Andre Aupech. The appointment carries a salary of \$750 a year, besides \$400 for expenses and assistants, a total of \$1,150.
