The duty placed on Canadian lumber going into the United States is not a serious matter in that the exemption is so important that it will not hamper business to any serious extent. If that is the end of the legislation to be passed by Congress in regard to lumber, it should prove satisfactory to Canadians. Even that impost was carried in the Senate by one vote only and it is not known whether or not this is final or whether the House of Representatives still has a say in regard to it.




